**MAYOR'S OFFICE,**  
MAY, 15, 1893.

I, Samuel R. Steel, Mayor of the Town of Clarksburg, in Harrison county, West Virginia, in conformity to the law in such cases made and provided, and pursuant to an order of the Council of said Town duly entered, do proclaim that an election by the qualified voters of said Town, be held in said Town on

**TUESDAY, THE 6TH DAY OF JUNE, 1893.**

to decide whether they will ratify or reject an ordinance adopted on the 12th day of May, 1893, by the Council of said Town, in the words and figures following, to-wit:

"An Ordinance, for the issue of bonds for the construction of a Filter Plant.

WHEREAS, It is necessary and expedient for the comfort and well being of the people of the Town of Clarksburg, and the protection of their health and lives against disease, by using the water of the West Fork of the Monongahela river, for domestic purposes, that there should be erected therein without delay, a suitable Filter Plant; and

WHEREAS, To carry out the object it is expedient that the town should issue and sell its bonds for money sufficient for that purpose.

THEREFORE, Be it ordained by the council of the Town of Clarksburg:

That the said town do issue its bonds of the denomination of one hundred dollars and multiples thereof, for a sum in the aggregate not exceeding five thousand dollars, each bearing date on the first day of July, 1893, and payable to bearer twenty years after the date thereof, with interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable annually from said date, which said bonds shall contain a provision expressed therein that they shall not be liable to taxation by said town; and that said town shall have the right at any time after ten years from the date of said bonds to release and discharge itself from any further liability arising from said bonds or any part of them by the payment thereof of the principal and interest due thereon. That each of said bonds shall be numbered and attested by the seal of the town affixed thereto, and be signed by the Mayor and Recorder. After said bonds shall have been so issued no more of them shall be sold than may be necessary to realize therefrom a sum sufficient for the construction of said Filter Plant, and none shall be sold for less than par.

It is further ordained: That the payment of the principal and interest of said bonds shall be provided for by a special tax upon the taxable property of said Town not exempt, until the interest and principal thereof are discharged. The election to decide whether the qualified voters of said Town will ratify or reject

**FORMATION OF PARTNERSHIP.**

Thorn a partner in said firm; that said firm is to transact or carry on the business of dealing in Produce, that is to say, in Flour, live and dressed, Eggs and Butter, Melons and Nuts in season, and said business shall be carried on or transacted in said town of Clarksburg and said partnership is to last twelve months from the time the same shall be formed under the laws of said State. Witness their signatures the day and year above written.

this ordinance, shall be held and conducted, and the result thereof certified, returned and finally determined under the laws in force in this State on March 11th, 1893. Provided, however, in the event, at such election, this ordinance be ratified, no ordinance authorizing the issuance of such bonds, or appointing Commissioners to supervise the erection of such plant, shall be passed by the Council of said Town, until after a majority of a Commission appointed by said Council, composed of not less than three citizens of said Town, not members of the Council thereof, shall examine the various systems of filtration and report favorably to said Council, and recommend a filtration plant or plants, which can be constructed within the sum to be so appropriated, and secure to the citizens of said Town, a pure and healthful water supply.

And I further proclaim that the aggregate amount of indebtedness issued and authorized by said Town, existing at the date of this proclamation is forty-one thousand five hundred dollars, with interest thereon from the first day of October, 1892.

**WORLD'S FAIR NOTES.**

**A Few Pointers About Chicago.**

As a great many readers of the TELEGRAM will make their first trip to Chicago during the World's Fair, a few pointers regarding the geography of the city will be appreciated. In the first place, fix firmly in your mind the fact that Lake Michigan forms the eastern boundary of the entire city, and if you stand facing the lake with both arms outstretched, the left hand will point the North Pole and the right hand will point straight down the tracks of the Big Four Route to the World's Fair Buildings, situated at the southern end of the city. Paste this in your hat and you have the key to the entire situation. Coming into Chicago on trains of the Big Four Route, which is the only railroad having an entrance on the south side along the lake front, where all the hotels and boarding houses are located, you will find your way passing practically through the Exposition Grounds and a magnificent panoramic view of the Fair is obtained.

At the World's Fair Station of the Big Four Route, if you step off at the right side, you are at the entrance gate to the Exposition and can begin "doing" the Fair at once; if you step off on the left side, you will find yourself in the finest residence portion of Chicago, and right in the midst of the World's Fair hotel and boarding house district. The chances are ten to one you will be within a few minutes walk of the very place where you have selected for your headquarters.

If you prefer to go down town, ten minutes ride will bring you to the new Twelfth Street Station in the heart of the city. Now bear in mind the manifest advantage of entering Chicago on the Big Four Route. In the first place you avoid entirely the bother and trouble of a tedious transfer across the city, which is necessary via all other lines, being landed directly at the Exposition Grounds, an advantage offered by no other line, and in the second place you can so fix the geography of the city in your mind that you will at once become as familiar with Chicago as you are with your own town.
