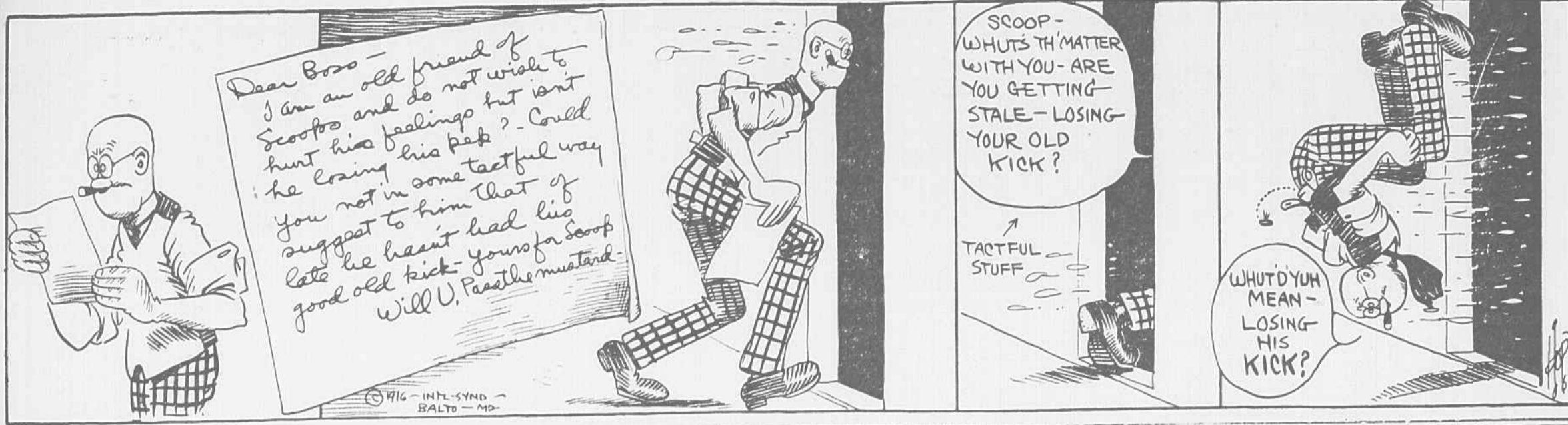

NILES, Mich., July 17.—Friend Harvey.—Probably you would like to know what I did and who I seen yesterday. 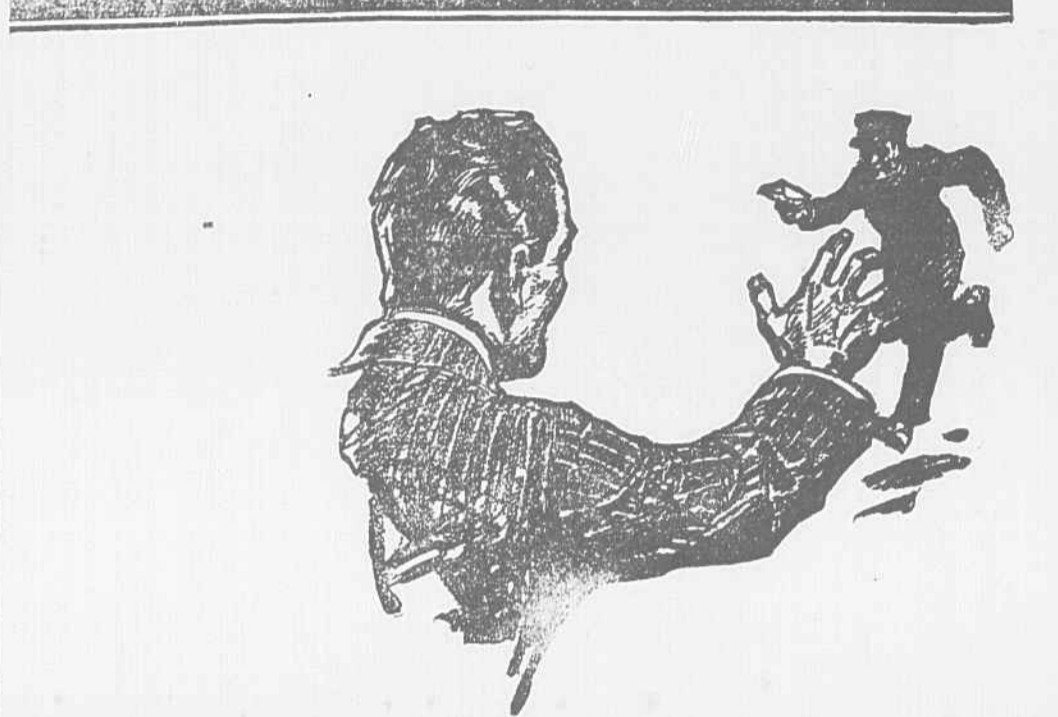
