BOARD OF EDUCATION, CLARK DISTRICT.

State of West Virginia, County of Harrison, District of Clark, to-wit:

At a regular session of the board of education of Clark district of Harrison county held at the regular meeting place thereof, on the second Tuesday in August, 1916, Present: A. P. Stewart, President of said board of education, and A. L. Carter and John W. Cork, Commissioners.

In accordance with Chapter 57, Acts 1915, amending section 21, chapter 27, Acts 1908, the board of education proceeded to make an estimate of the amount necessary to be levied for the current fiscal year, to cover all district debts and liabilities payable during the year, including the probable expenditures for district purposes, and proper allowances for delinquent taxes, expenses of collection and contingencies, but deducting the money in the treasury applicable to the service of the year and district claims both determined and estimate the several amounts to be levied as follows:

BUILDING FUND ESTIMATE.

Estimated Receipts. The amount due, and the amount that will become due and collectible from every source, except from the levy of taxes to be made for the current fiscal year.

The debts and demands owed by the district as a whole, and payable out of the building fund.

It appearing to the board of education that the total valuation of all taxable property in this district, according to the last assessment thereof, is \$5,084,192.00, being real estate to the value of \$2,431,800.00, and railroad and other property assessed by the board of public works to the value of \$2,652,392.00, as certified to this board by the officer whose duty it is to make such report, and it appearing from the foregoing estimates that it is necessary to raise by levy, after deducting all credits, \$7,026.25 for building purposes and \$10,183.55 for teachers' purposes; therefore it is determined that a levy of fifteen cents (15c) for building and twenty cents (20c) for teachers' purposes will be necessary to produce the estimated amount as aforesaid for the ensuing fiscal year.
