King Peter's Refuge One of Much Interest

According to a Description Given of It by National Geographic Society.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—Euboea, the Greek island in the Aegean sea, where the exiled King Peter of Serbia is reported to have found a temporary asylum, is the subject of today's war geography bulletin by the National Geographic Society, which says:

"The northern promontories of Euboea, on one of which the aged throneless sovereign of the nation which plunged Europe into the greatest war in the world's history is reported to have taken refuge, are most interesting sections of this island which became a part of the kingdom of Greece in 1830.

"Euboea corresponds in size almost exactly to Long Island, N. Y., having an area only four square miles larger than the latter. It extends along the northeastern shore of Greece, being a little less than 100 miles long, and varying in width from four to thirty miles. It is separated from Bœotia by the narrow Euboeic sea, which becomes constricted to the Strait of Euripus at the narrowest point, a town of about 8,000 inhabitants. At this point the island is separated from the mainland by only a few yards. A rock rising from the waters of the strait forms an anchorage for a stone bridge between it and the mainland, and for a swinging bridge toward Chalcis, the latter being necessary to allow vessels to pass through the channel, where at irregular intervals during the day the waters rush with the velocity of a swift river, sometimes from north to south and at other times in the opposite direction, according to the tide. When the Euboeans revolted from Athens during the Peloponnesian wars the Bœotians constructed the first bridge across the strait, making Euboea an island to every one except themselves."

Famous Waters.
"If King Peter has chosen the northeastern promontory of Euboea as his home while awaiting that day when he hopes the Entente Allies will succeed in driving the enemy out from Serbian soil, he can overlook the waters where the battle of Artemisium was fought in 480 B. C., a prelude to the greater glory of Salamis and the heroic defense of the Pass of Thermopylae. It was at Artemisium that the Greek fleet, commanded by Themistocles, the father of the Athenian 'wooden walls' as its navy came to be known, met the superior naval forces of Xerxes in a three days' battle. While not achieving a decisive victory, the patriotic fleet received its 'baptism of blood' which prepared it for subsequent triumphs over the Persian hordes.

"If, on the other hand, the exile has chosen the more picturesque northwestern promontory, under the shadow of Mount Gaetsades with its heights clothed in medicinal shrubs, he will be able to enjoy the famous Baths of Heracles. These sulphur waters, which are still much frequented by the Greeks who suffer from gout, rheumatism and digestive ailments, afforded a favorite retreat for the Roman dictator, Cornelius Sulla, self styled 'Venus's favorite,' but known to his enemies as 'half lion, half fox.' One of the few acts of clemency recorded of Sulla was his removal of the name of Julius Caesar from the prescribed list of adherents of the Marius party. In sparing the life of this youth of 19 Sulla is reputed to have exclaimed prophetically: 'There is in that boy many a Marius.'

Narrow Strait.
"At one point on the northwestern coast Euboea is separated from Thessaly by a strait which is only a mile and a half broad. In this strait the final episodes in the eventful life of the Greek demi-god Hercules were supposed to have occurred. It was after he had accomplished his twelve labors that Hercules erected an altar in Euboea to his father, Zeus. He sent a messenger, Lichas, to Thrace for a white robe to be used in the dedication ceremonies. Lichas brought a cloak given to him by the jealous Delira, who believed that the garment, dipped in the blood of the dying centaur, Nessus, was a love charm. It proved to be a fiery and fatal poison. Hercules, as soon as he felt the sting of the coat, hurled the innocent Lichas over a cliff, near the village which now bears the latter's name, and which may be King Peter's retreat.

"The most beautiful scenery in all Greece is to be found in the fertile valleys and towering mountains of Euboea, which gets its name, 'rich in cattle,' from the fine pasture land of its plains. The inhabitants, more than 100,000 in number, are chiefly engaged in cattle raising and in agriculture, the principal exports being wool, hides, wheat, oil and cheese.

"Chalcis, the chief seaport of the island, is only fifty miles by rail northeast of Athens."

Duster in Pleasant County.
The shallow sand territory is completing a good many dusters. A good producer is no indication that another can be had a few hundred feet away. On Sugar creek, Union district, Pleasant county, the Big Three Oil Company drilled its No. 4 on the R. A. Gorrell farm through the Cow Run sand and gave it a shot, but it failed to respond and has been abandoned. Some of the wells showed very little oil when drilled through the sand, but made fair producers after a case of the high explosive fluid had been administered.

On Blue creek, Elk district, Kanawha county, the Ohio Fuel Oil Company has shot its test on the same farm, 3,000 feet north of the same company's test on the W. C. and B. Jarrett farm. About five barrels a day will be its caliber. On Mill creek, in the same district, the South Penn Oil Company has the rig up for No. 5 on the C. B. Graham farm. On Pine creek, same district, the Ohio Fuel Oil Company is drilling another test on the Isabelle Myers farm.

Food Damages Oil Property.
The food in the Paint and Cabin creek districts in Kanawha county caused damage to all property but how much is not known. It was reported that the Ohio Fuel Oil Company's well on the Kittinger farm on the east bank of Cabin creek had lost its rig and damage had been done the Columbus Producing Company's wells on the same stream.

In Freeman's Creek district, Lewis county, the South Penn Oil Company's No. 3 on the Timothy Joyce farm is a gasser in the Gordon sand. In the same district the Philadelphia Company has rigs completed for tests on the H. Patten and T. O. Law farms. The Carter Oil Company is down 1,100 feet at No. 3 on the Connelly heirs' farm and fishing.

Southeastern Ohio.

The deep sand territory in southeastern Ohio is completing wells regularly, some being creditable producers. In Pike township, Coshoc county, the Columbus Oil and Fuel Company has completed No. 3 on the W. H. Ashcraft farm. It is a fifty-barrel producer in the Clinton sand.

In the Berea grit territory, Clay township, Washington county, Roseville district, R. C. Hyatt and Company's No. 4 on the E. E. Thompson farm is a five barrel pumper in the Berea grit. In the Cow Run district,

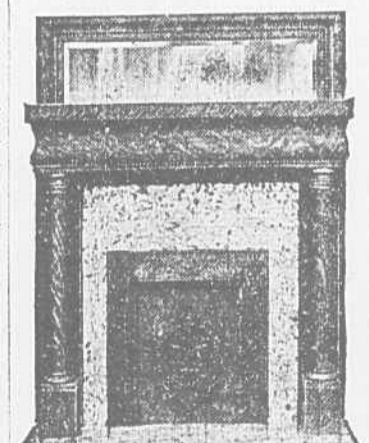

In Clay district, Ritchie county, W. Va., the Imperial Oil and Gas Products Company drilled its No. 3 on the John Keith farm through the Big Injun sand and it is showing for a twelve-barrel pumper. In Union district in the Harrisonville pool, Brodie and Hawk drilled their test on the D. S. Patton farm through the Squaw sand

Near Knoxville, Knox township, Jefferson county, D. C. Burns and Company have a dry hole on the Stanley Henderson farm. In Island Creek township the Sapp Oil Company's No. 13 on the A. N. Wiles farm is a light pumper. In the northwest quarter of section 29, Green township, Harrison county, the Fox Oil Company's test on the J. H. Laughlin farm is a three-barrel pumper in the Berea grit.

Good Producer in Greene County.
In Aleppo township, Greene county, Pa., in the Campbell district, Cochran and Fink has drilled its test in the John Riggs heirs' farm eighteen feet into the Gordon sand. It is swabbing and flowing seventy-five barrels a day. When drilled deeper an increase in production is expected. In the same district, the Wyoming Fuel Oil Company's test on the H. G. Grim farm is producing thirty barrels a day.

DOGS

Until the 10th day of September, 1916, the State Board of Health authorities require dogs to be kept tied up or muzzled.

Five days from this date the dog catcher will be notified to kill any dog found running at large (August 10, 1916). On and after August 16, 1916, if a dog is found running at large and the owner misses the dog the chances are that it has fell a victim of the dog catcher.

Male dogs in the city of Clarksburg should be assessed One Dollar and females Five Dollars. After September 1, 1916 this ordinance will be enforced and any dogs found running at large will be taken up and shot if no license tag can be found or no record in the City Clerk's office showing that a license has been issued to the owner of such dog.

Any person owning a dog and wants the same disposed of can notify the police department or the health department and the dog will be sent for and killed free of charge.

Cities and towns all over the country are fighting the dog nuisance and Clarksburg does not want to be a back number on anything. Get license on your dog or have him disposed of.

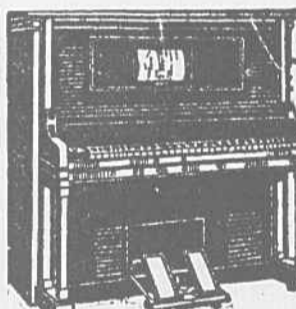
