The manager employed two non-union men on the yard and as soon as they went to work nearly the entire force of about seventy-five men walked out. The latter were immediately given their time and were paid off. This closes the mill, and it looks as if a strike of indefinite length is on.

### Williamson's New Court House.

The new court house of Mingo county, which has been in course of construction for some time, is now completed and for the first time the sessions of the circuit court will be held in the new building. The cost of the handsome structure is \$42,408.
