## SWITGHMAN KILLED.

Hayes Patterson Meets an Untimely Death.

Hayes Patterson, a switchman in the Kenova yards, met an untimely death on Tuesday evening, August 29th, while in the discharge of his duties. The unfortunate young man was engaged in shifting a baggage car at Kenova Union station and in attempting to pass around the corner of the car's vestibule to set a brake, he lost his footing and fell. His head struck the iron boxing of the car and the momentum of the fall was such that his skull was crushed, besides he received several other wounds. Death was almost instantaneous.

Mr. Patterson was twenty eight years of age. He had been in the services of the N. & W. R'y Co. for the past four years, and was a very valuable employe.

He was united in marriage some four years since to Miss Harriet Ball, daughter of Rev. Wayne Ball, of South Ceredo. Into this union two children were born, a son and daughter.

The deceased was a member of the I. O. O. F. and K. of G. E. lodges, which orders attended the funeral and burial in a body.

Rev. B. S. Akers, assisted by Rev. J. F. Kanuth, conducted the funeral services at the Ceredo M. E. church last Wednesday, after which the remains were conveyed to Brown's Hill cemetery and interred in their last resting place.
