Kenova's Election.

The Kenova municipal election held on Thursday of last week was hotly contested from beginning to end, but judging from the returns the Citizens' party's engine was torn to pieces by the arm and hammer of the People's Progressive party. There were 196 votes cast and Mayor W. B. Mor is won over his opponent (J. E. Kesinger) by a majority of 16. C. W. Thomson left in his wake G. K. Osgood, candidate for recorder, by the small majority of 2. For councilman the majorities ranged from 2 to 5, with the exception of W. P. Harris and F. E. Way, who tied. Unless these gentlemen choose to draw straws it will be up to the council to decide who shall serve the city. Eliminating Messrs. Harris and Way the new council stands as follows: W. B. Morris, mayor; C. W. Thomson, recorder; W. G. Smith, M. D. Hatten, Chas. Lambert and J. I. Miller, councilmen. The last named gentleman was the only man on the Citizens' ticket that was elected, he having defeated H. H. Bimpson.

Fire.

Last Thursday evening about 7 o'clock the alarm of fire was heard on our streets and it was soon discovered that the residence of Nicholas Copley, situated on East First street, was on fire. The fire department was on the scene, together with about one-third of the population of town, in a very short time and the blaze was extinguished in about twenty minutes after water first began playing on the destructive fire.

The fire originated in some manner from the gas, although it is not definitely known just how. The rear of the structure was badly damaged by fire and some of the household effects by water.

ANOTHER BLAZE.

At the time the Copley residence was burning an accident occurred in the cottage, owned by Hoard Bros. and occupied by Wm. Fugett, just across the street, which nearly caused that dwelling to go up in smoke. Mrs. Fugett, in her haste to go to the Copley fire, dropped a cape on a gas stove and not knowing she had done so, hastily left the building. When she returned in a few minutes the room was full of smoke and a good-sized fire under headway. This blaze was extinguished with but little damage.

THE ARTZ PROPERTY,

Situate on "Segur Hill," Destroyed by Fire Last Sunday.

The dwelling owned by George Artz and situate on Segur Hill, about one and one-half miles from Ceredo, was entirely destroyed by fire about eleven o'clock, a. m., last Sunday. Nearly all of Mr. Artz's household goods were also burned.

The total loss will probably amount to \$1500.00. There were \$500 insurance on the building and \$200 on household goods, placed in the German Insurance Co., of Wheeling.

A defective chimney is believed to have caused the fire, as the blaze was first discovered on the second floor.
