

By the President of the United States.

WHEREAS by the act entitled "An act, making provision for the disposal of Public Lands, situated between the United States Military Tract and the Connecticut Reserve, and other purposes," it was enacted, that for the disposal of the lands of the United States, situated between the United States Military Tract and the Connecticut Reserve, a Land-office should be established at such place as the President of the United States might direct. And it was further enacted, that the Lands aforesaid, with the exception of certain tracts therein excepted, be offered for sale to the highest bidder, at the place aforesaid, on such day or days, as shall by a Publick Proclamation of the President of the United States be designated for that purpose, in tracts of the same size, and on the same terms and conditions, as are provided for the lands North of the River Ohio, and above the Mouth of Kentucky River.

Wherefore, I, Thomas Jefferson, President of the United States, in conformity with the provisions of the act before recited, do hereby declare and make known, that sales shall be held at CANTON, in the State of Ohio, for the disposal of the above mentioned lands, to commence on the second Monday of May, one thousand eight hundred and eight, and continue for and during the six following weeks.
