WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 3.—Arthur B. Pugh, an examiner in the Interstate Commerce Commission, died in a hospital here and his remains were taken to Salem, Va., for interment. Mr. Pugh was a West Virginian and was born in Hampshire county March 26, 1854, the son of Lemuel and Elizabeth A. Pugh. He was educated in the public schools and at the University of Virginia. In 1878 he was admitted to the bar, practicing in Virginia and West Virginia. In 1897 he came to Washington to practice, and in 1906 became an examiner for the Interstate Commerce Commission. He handled many important cases for the commission. He married Louise Boggs Anderson, of Franklin, W. Va., in 1885. She died in 1896. He is survived by two daughters, Misses Mary and Louise Pugh.


