"LOST BIRD" GOING BACK TO LAND OF SIOUX WITH FORTUNE LEFT HER BY INDIAN FIGHTER

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 4.—"Lost Bird" is going back to Dakota and the Sioux Indians. And she is going with gold to help them.

The Indian girl's name is Zintkella Andl, which signifies "Lost Bird." She is a full-blooded Sioux of the Sitting Bull band.

Three weeks ago all bade fair to end in tragedy. Today everything is bright. And as soon as the formalities are gone through with the Sioux

and left her destitute. The girl tried an engagement with a road show and met with most unfortunate circumstances. Left without any money, she told her story to an actress living in the same hotel.

This girl told Zintkella Anuni and the Indian girl's heart was moved. She insisted that the lonely lass live with her and her husband.

"I am glad of the money, of course," she said. "But what I thought of first was the chance to do so much for my people I want to help."

"Just as a start, I am going to give poor Pearl a home with me. She shall come back to Dakota. She is young, bright and sensitive, and ought to have an education instead of facing the hardships of the vaudeville life."

"Then I hope to do something permanent on a large scale for the Sioux people. They are in need of help. I have visited the reservation several times and have seen my relatives. I have a twin sister who was found, like myself, strapped to the back of our dead mother!"

New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—The market was subjected again almost to the caprices of professional traders yesterday, that faction availing itself of various developments and complications to depress prices of leading stocks from three to six points. Extensive short covering contributed to irregular and for the most part nominal rallies at the close.

Price movements were most bewildering throughout the session, not less than three successive declines and rallies occurring in the first three hours, with some relaxation of pressure later. Public interest was altogether negligible, even the more representative rails showing little support from that source.

Grain and Produce.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Expectation of extensive reselling by foreigners in the event of actual peace did a good deal today to bring about declines in the value of wheat. Closing prices were unsettled, 1/4 to 3/4c net lower with May at 1.48 1/2 to 1.48 1/2. Corn finished at 1/4c off to 1/4c up, oats showing a set back of 1/4 to 1c and provisions advanced 2c to 6c.

Oil and Gas.

On Big run, Liberty district, Marshall county, W. Va. the Carnegie Natural Gas company has drilled a test on the John Mackey farm into the Maxon sand. When tested the well showed a capacity of 10,000,000 cubic feet a day. It is shallow sand and there is some doubt as to its staying qualities. Had the volume been developed in the Gordon sand it would have been a more important strike.

One mile east of the old Moscow field in Grant district, Hancock county, Talbert Bros. had the courage to drill a test on their own farm. Unfortunately it is a duster in the Berea grit. For some time it has become something of a feature for land owners to test their own property.

In Clay district, Ritchie county, the Imperial Oil and Gas Products company drilled a second test on the Clinton Detson farm into the Big Injun sand and developed a gasser. This location is 500 feet east of No. 1, which came in a big producer a little more than a month ago. In the same locality the same company is due in the sand at a test on the Gaynor farm.

On Willey Fork, a branch of Richwood run, Grant district, Wetzel county, the Richwood Oil company has completed and shot its No. 5 on the John Mills farm and it is not good for more than five barrels a day in the Gordon sand. In the same district, the Kanawha Oil company is due in the sand at No. 130 on the John Mills tract and drilling No. 131 on the same lease.

Development work is increasing in Union district, Clay county. In this district the Ohio Fuel Oil company drilled its test on the J. L. Mines farm through the Big Injun sand and it shows for a light pump. This is a wildcat location, 1,900 feet southwest of the same company's No. 3 on the Harper Minor farm. In the same district O. L. Davis will be due in the sand next week at No. 3 on the H. L. Samples farm. The yield of gasolene from the casing-head gas in the well in Clay county is very large and that alone

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6.—Representative Harry C. Woodruff today nominated Charles Henry Bryan, of Parkersburg, for appointment to take the examinations for admission to the United States Military academy at West Point; and Frank Albert Woodruff, also of Parkersburg, as Bryan's alternate. Young Bryan is a son of C. E. Bryan, prominent official of the B. & O., and young Woodruff is a son of J. F. Woodruff, a leading citizen of Parkersburg who, although he has the same name, is not related to the congressman.

Mr. Woodruff at the Pension bureau today called up the papers in the pension cases of Nancy J. Anderson, of Harmony, Roane county, and Andrew Clark Mellentree, of Parkersburg, the latter an application for an original pension and the former asking for an increase under the recently enacted Ashbrooke law.

Representative Neely has recommended the appointment of E. B. Gaylor for appointment as postmaster at Duty, Lewis county, succeeding Arch E. Fleming, resigned; and James A. Neyland at Monarch, Kanawha county, an office which has been newly re-established upon request of Representative Adam Littlepage.

Hon. L. J. Forman, of Great county, is a visitor in the capital and was a caller upon Representative George M. Powers today. Mr. Forman served two terms in the state senate and upon several occasions was a candidate for the nomination for congress, the last time against Mr. Bowers. It has been a long-standing ambition of Senator Forman to serve in congress, but he has never been successful with it.
