The present week will be a big one at the Hippodrome. Jack Grant and his "Winter Garden Girls" started in for a full week there today, presenting "On the Veranda" for the opening bill. This skit was presented on the previous appearance of this company several weeks ago, but only for one day, and this fact created a disappointment in some circles, as many who had been lucky enough to see it told their friends about it, but it was too late for them to share in the enjoyment of seeing it.
