## BITS OF STATE NEWS

## Tabloid History of Russia

### Scattered Principalities Take on National Unity Under Ivan, Who Expels the Mongolian Overlords!

(Third Chapter of The West Virginian's Tabloid History of Russia.)  
 Russia under the Mongol yoke was gradually united into the grand principality of Muscovy, with Moscow as a capital.

At the same time Lithuania became powerful in western Russia. Novgorod remained an independent republic, and Sweden and the Livonian knights prevented Muscovy's expansion to the north, Poland to the west, Turkey to the south.

Had Novgorod cast her lot with Lithuania, history might have been different. This republic, which had invited the dynasty of Rurik to Russia in 862 A. D., submitted to the grand prince of Muscovy in 1470. Thus the foundation of the modern Russian empire was laid.

Principality after principality submitted to Muscovy, whose ruler became known as Ivan the Great.

Inner dissension among the Mongolian overlords of Russia caused the empire founded by Genghis Khan to be split into smaller parts. In European Russia appeared the Khanates of Kazan, Astrakhan and Crimea, and the Horde of the Nogais.

Khan was established on the ruins of the ancient Bulgaria, on the Volga. Ivan the Great used the petty jealousies among the Tatars to aid his cause, and in 1478, having made himself a despot over the Russian principalities, he rebelled against the Mongolian overlords.

Ivan trampled under foot the image of the khan which the latter's envoys brought in their journey to receive Russia's tribute. Then he slew all the envoys but one, who was permitted to carry the news to the Mongolian horde.

The Moscovites and the Mongols faced each other finally across a river, over which insults were hurled. Winter came; ice formed between the two inactive armies. Still there was no battle. Suddenly unexplained panic seized both armies; the Moscovites retreated toward Moscow and the Tatars returned into Asia, never again to reconquer their Russian empire. Thus ingloriously was Russia's victory over her Asiatic overlords won, aided by the collusion of Crimea, one of the independent colonies left in Russia by the Tatar overflow.

Ivan the Great next fought incon-

clusive wars with the Lithuanians, and invited Greeks and Italians into the court of Russia, which now, the Mongol influence gone, began again to assume the character of a European state.

Ivan the Great's grandson, Ivan the Terrible, assumed the throne in 1547, and signaled his reign by conquering and annexing Kazan and Astrakhan, holding the Crimeans in check, and driving the Teutonic oppressors from Livonia and Estonia. Poland took Livonia from Russia, but Ivan sent the Cossacks across the Urals and took possession of western Siberia. Sweden and Poland prevented him from getting a port on the Baltic.

The later years of Ivan's life were marked by great cruelties. He invented the pastime of boiling in oil. At the same time he formed an alliance with England, marking Russia's permanent entry into affairs of western Europe.

A succession of minor czars was followed by a period of strife between pretenders to the throne, which ended in the revolution of 1605-1613. The entire land was bathed in blood, and order was restored only when a national assembly of representatives declared the line of Rurik extinct and conferred the throne upon Michael Fedorovitch, first czar of the house of Romanoff.

The Romanoff's first exploits will be told tomorrow.
