Baby Welfare week will be observed in this city April 29 to May 6 and this observance will be in accord with a nation wide movement for the betterment of conditions that surround the baby.

A meeting of representatives of various women's organizations of the city was held yesterday at the Watson hotel when plans were discussed for the observance of Baby week.

It is the intention during this week to carry forward considerable settlement work and to try if possible to visit homes where children do not receive the proper care and instruct mothers in improved methods. Lectures will also be given in the schools of the city and possibly sermons will be preached from the pulpits.

Prizes will be given to the boy or girl giving the best slogan for the campaign for better babies and also to the boy or girl writing the best essay on the baby.

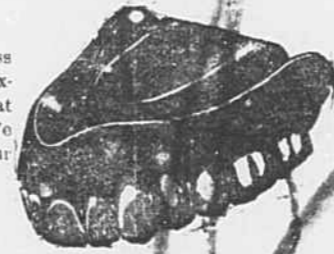
