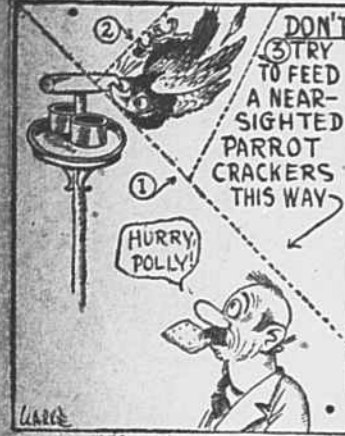

WAR RUMOR STARTS MARRIAGE BOOM

All Records Were Broken at Pittsburgh Marriage License Bureau.

PITTSBURGH, April 10.—All records were broken at the marriage license office in Wylie avenue yesterday when 164 licenses were issued, more than in any other day since the marriage license law went into effect. From early morning until late in the afternoon the office was crowded with young men and women, many of them accompanied by parents or older friends. The applicants waited in line for a chance to appear before one of the clerks. Four men were kept busy issuing the licenses.

The unprecedented rush is attributed to the circulation of false rumor throughout this section of the state that the Allegheny county marriage license office would be closed by the government to prevent the marriage of young men of military age, thus avoiding the first call to arms. The rumor seems to be so widespread that the clerks of the office intend to notify the Federal authorities. They are of the opinion that an organized force has been systematically circulating the rumor to impede recruiting.

INDUSTRIAL FAIRMONT

C. A. Wolfe, general superintendent of the American Valve and Tank Co., is in town looking over the site for the new factory and planning the location of the machinery, some of which has already arrived. Work on the factory has been delayed somewhat by the rainy weather but it was resumed today and it is hoped that the foundation will be completed very soon. The machinery which has arrived will be stored in a temporary structure which is being erected now. A number of pieces of machinery arrived some time ago have been in storage at the freight depot pending the erection of the temporary storage house on the factory grounds and work on this has been delayed because of the walkout of the union carpenters employed by the contractors Hohlert and Spedden.

A grave was being prepared today in the vacant lot next to the Fairmont Auto Supply shop, a grave in which will be buried the huge gasoline tank belonging to the Supply Company. The tank is cylindrical in shape, measures ten feet by three and a half feet in diameter and will contain five hundred and fifty gallons of gas. The pump which will be placed in the next curb in front of the shop, is the largest of its kind in town and is capable of lifting five gallons at a stroke.

Excavation work for the new Fairmont Garage which has been postponed for a few days owing to the inclement weather was resumed today and the erecting of a foundation will begin in a few days.

Storage tanks capable of holding 250,000 gallons of crude oil are to be built this summer by the Monongah Glass company to provide the plant with fuel, according to the plans adopted for burning crude oil under the pots at the plant. Engineer Shrewsbury Miller has been retained to make a report on the different types of oil storage and immediately on the adoption of his report the construction will be started. The tanks will be built some little distance from the main factory building and below the railroad tracks that run along the East side of the factory. The oil will be drawn from the tank cars by gravity and pumped back to the big burners as needed.
