By winning the pentathlon at the Penn relay for the third successive year, Howard Berry, U. of P. all around athlete, established a record which consistency is one of the greatest in the history of athletics.

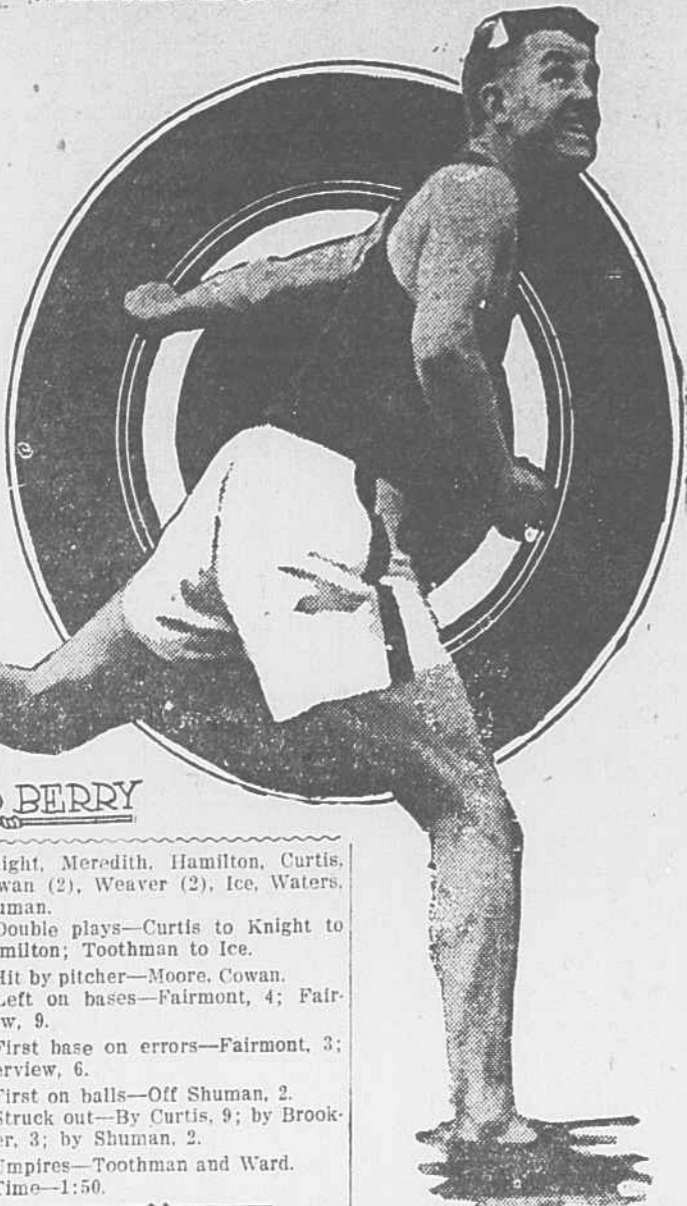
It is all the more remarkable when considered that Berry does not have the natural athletic ability of Jim Thorpe or of one or two of the nation's greatest all-around performers.

To win the pentathlon one must compete in five events, broad jump, discus throw, javelin hurl and the 200 and 1500 meter races, events which demand every effort of the athlete.

In this year's meet Berry won four of the events and finished third in the discus.

In addition to his track activities Berry is a good baseball player and a star at football.

NORMAL TEAM TO TAKE 3 DAY TRIP

Will Play Moundsville, West Liberty and Bethany While Away.

Tomorrow morning the Normal baseball team will leave for a three-day trip in the northern part of the state, playing Moundsville High, West Liberty Normal and Bethany college. The three games are probably the strongest combination that the Normal will this year have on her schedule. Moundsville High was last year state high school champions, playing several of the Ohio colleges as well as a few league teams without losing a single game. Many of the same players are again in the line-up and will make the normal play real college baseball to win.

On Friday the team will go to West Liberty where they will meet the West Liberty Normal. West Liberty is known throughout the state for its baseball teams and if its 1917 team is in any way compared to its previous teams, another hard game is expected for the Normal.

The last game of the trip will be played Saturday at Bethany, where the local boys are expecting to get revenge for the defeat given them in

Fairmont. Since the game with Bethany here the Normal line-up has been switched considerably and is now without doubt much stronger. Isenhardt, who has been located at first base is now playing his usual good game at short stop. Bell is gradually developing into a competent first baseman and is covering his position in good style. The Normal has begun to hit the ball and to hit it hard, as was shown in the recent game at Philippi when the Normal piled up 14 hits in five innings, many of which were for extra bases.

Although the Normal realizes that they have three strong games before them, they are leaving confident of bringing home the bacon.
