NEW PITCHING MARK IS SET AT CHICAGO

Neither Club Made Hit or Run in Nine Innings.

CHICAGO, May 3.—A world's record was established here yesterday in a 30-inning game between Cincinnati and Chicago when after the game had gone nine innings neither club had registered a hit or run, Cincinnati won, 1 to 0.

For the nine innings Vaughn, assisted by remarkable defense by the Chicago infield, did not permit a Cincinnati player to reach second base, and in this only slightly surpassed his pitching opponent, Toney, who allowed one Chicago runner to reach second.

Vaughn struck out 10 Cincinnati batsmen, while only three were fanned by Toney.

The game was won when in the tenth inning, after one was out, Kopf singled, advanced to third when Williams dropped Chase's fly and scored when Thorpe hit a slow bounder to Vaughn.

The Cincinnati outfielders several times saved the game for Toney, Custo on one occasion backing into the left field fence for Merkle's fly.

Chick Evans, national amateur and open champion, will have his hands full this year trying to defend both titles.

Evans, by the way, is the first golfer to have this chore on his hands in one year, being the only golfer to win both titles in a season.

The removal of Oulmet and Travers

from competition in the amateur tournament this year, the former because of his undetermined status with the National Golf association and the latter because he probably cannot get in shape to play tournament golf this year, will not make Evans' task a path of roses by any means.

Bob Gardner, former amateur champion; Anderson, Jacoby, the southern

champion and several others are already in shape to play championship golf and all have turned out some very pretty scores already this season.

In professional ranks Jock Hutchinson, Long Jim Barnes and Walter Hagen all have their eyes fixed on Evans' open title.

Evans must defend his open title on the difficult Brae Burn course and is likely to find the going much more difficult than at Minnehaha, where he won his title last year.

The Brae Burn course offers particularly difficult hazards at the short game and to turn the course in 75 is exceptional play. Evans is not the wonder at the short game that he has proved himself to be at the long and this may bother him considerably.

HIGH SCHOOL LAD SETS RECORD WITH TWO NO-HIT GAMES IN ONE WEEK!

COLUMBUS, O., May 3.—Lewis Dudley, 18-year-old high school lad, is the possessor of what is believed to be a world's record. He performed the remarkable stunt of pitching no-hit games on successive times out, the two record performances coming within a week of each other.

On Friday, April 20, Dudley, who pitches for North high, blanked Trade high without a hit. In this game only one man reached first, getting on in the sixth when Dudley hit him with a pitched ball. Five days later Dudley blanked Commerce high without a hit. In this game only three men reached first, (all of them on passes).

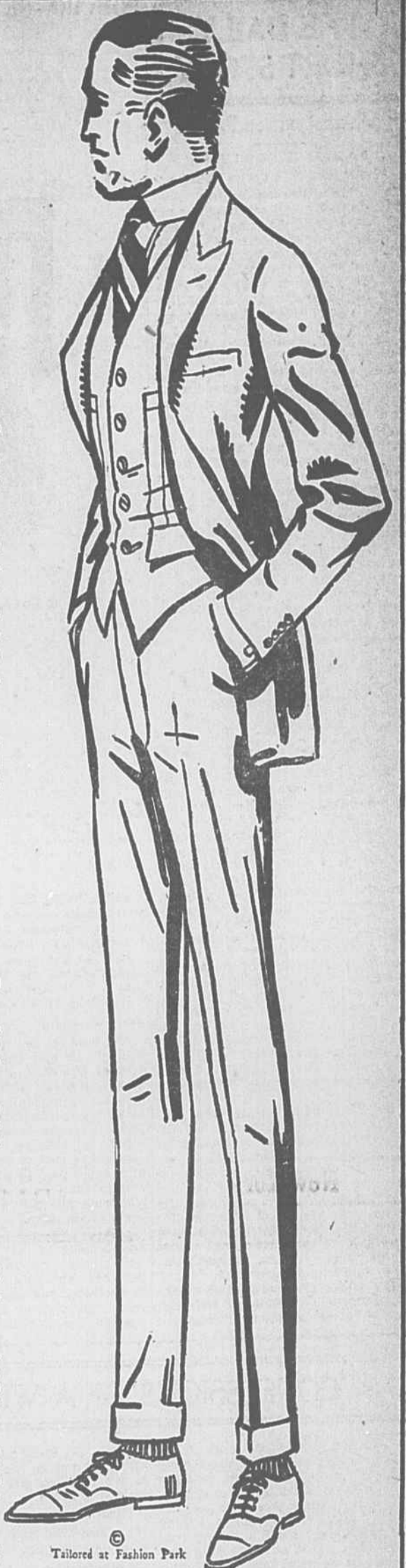
