Wheeling Convention Survivor Dies (By Associated Press) GRAFTON, Sept. 13.—William T. Brown among the oldest residents of this city died here this morning aged 83. He was the last survivor of the famous Wheeling convention that met in 1861 to take steps toward the formation of West Virginia and was the youngest delegate in that body. He was a staunch Republican and unionist. He was a bridge builder throughout war and while in charge of a bridge building crew on the B. and O. railroad near Bridgeport, was taken prisoner in the famous Jones raid and for six months was confined in Libby prison.
