ANDERSON HELD FOR B&O CAR ROBBERIES

Charge Against Starns Changed to Receiving Stolen Goods.

Cases growing out of alleged robberies of freight cars of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad company in the yards in Fairmont recently took place yesterday afternoon before Justice Conaway. James Anderson, who has been a driver of the city garbage wagon, was heard and in default of \$1,000 bail he was remanded to jail to appear before the grand jury. H. G. Starns and Worthie Slater were not heard. The petty larceny charge against Worthie Slater was dismissed and the charge against Starns was altered, having been reduced to receiving stolen goods from larceny; Starns' bond was fixed at \$300. He will have to appear before Justice Conaway to answer that charge on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Only two witnesses were called, they being B. & O. officers. They testified that they were waiting on a train for Grafton on the night of September 25, and while here decided to walk up through the yards. All of the cars had been sealed and after a time they heard a noise which apparently came from a box car in front of them. Just before they reached the car a man leaped out and tried to escape. They claim it was Anderson and say that he gave them several phoney addresses in the city of Fairmont. They testified that Anderson had a school bag over his back and swore that Anderson admitted that he was looking for shoes.

The detectives testified that in the car in which the man sprang out that there was a shipment of candy from McKeesport, Pa., to the Parker store, this city. The candy was strewn about but nothing as far as they could learn was missing. When Anderson was searched after his arrest the officers testified that they found in his pocket a broken seal, which belonged to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad company.

On cross-examination conducted by Attorney L. C. Musgrave one of the detectives admitted that the seal was the only property of the B. & O., which was found on Anderson. They claimed that Anderson admitted his guilt and set the time of the robbery between 8:30 and 9 o'clock on the night of September 25. While Anderson was not called, he denies any admission of guilt.

After Anderson was arrested a search warrant was issued and his premises were visited by the officers. There a lot of goods were found and these were brought to the justice's office at the hearing on Friday afternoon. The officers think that these goods were taken in August, but it is understood that thus far they have not made out a case.

Mrs. Anderson claimed about a week ago in a printed statement that some of the goods had belonged to her and some belonged to Anderson before he married her.

Charles E. Miller, assistant prosecuting attorney, represented the state; J. P. Kirby represented the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad company; attorney C. L. Musgrave represented Anderson and Slater and Marshall W. Ogden represented Starns.
