MANY PARENTS AT THE WHITE SCHOOL

Interesting Program Was Rendered And Fine Speeches Made

There was a good turn out of the parents at the Parent-Teacher meeting held at the White school yesterday evening and all were well pleased with the excellent program which they heard. The speakers were General Manager E. B. Moore of the Monongahela Valley Traction Company, Mrs. N. R. C. Morrow of the Normal school faculty, R. T. Cunningham of the Monongah Valley company, President of the Board of Education G. M. Alexander, and Mrs. C. R. Weirich. A number of their children, Miss Radel Herndon and Miss Bertha Dilgard and there were several vocal numbers by the school children. The high school orchestra was present and also gave several musical selections.

The talks were all short and to the point. They were centralized on the cooperation of the parents and teachers. Following the program each of the teachers went to their various rooms where they were visited by the parents, many of whom inquired into the work of their children. Joseph Daugherty, the janitor, who is a great favorite with the children also held an interesting informal reception. The meeting yesterday evening was the third parent-teacher meeting conducted in the Fairmont schools. The first was held at the Barnes school and the second at the Miller school.

Bootleggers Now Are Federal Prisoners

Meigs McCray was heard this morning by United States Commissioner Kirby for bringing whiskey into "bone dry" territory contrary to the prohibition laws. He was held for the next session of Federal court, which will be held on November 13, at Philippi.

Warrants were served by Deputy United States Marshal John Moore, of Morgantown, upon Anna Payne, colored, and Frank Arnold of the East Side, both being charged with bringing intoxicating liquor into dry territory. At the hearing it developed that Anna Payne was carrying whiskey in a suit case from Monongah to Carolina Mines and as this did not constitute a Federal offense she was let go. Arnold, who was charged with bringing whiskey into Fairmont from Pennsylvania, was held for the action of the Federal court. In default of bail in the sum of \$1,000 he was sent back to await the action of the court.

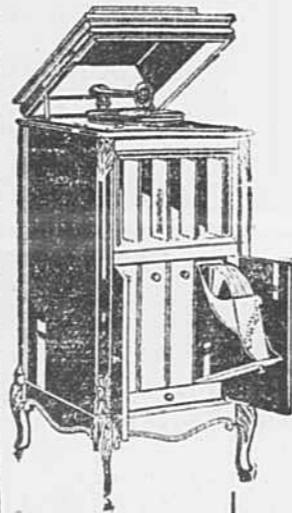

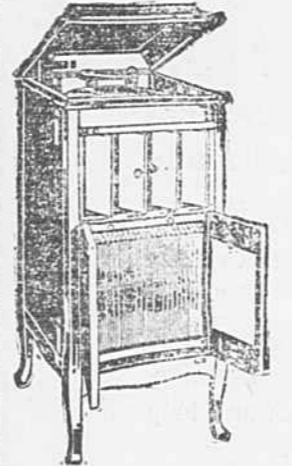

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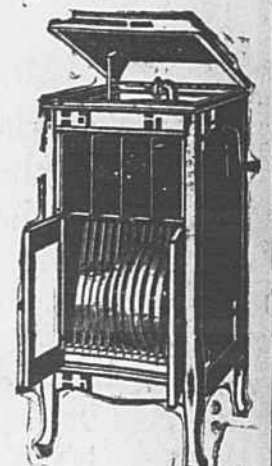
