THE THIRD LIBERTY LOAN

No more appropriate date could have been selected for the initiation of the third Liberty Loan than April 6, the anniversary of the entrance of the United States into the world war. And this campaign undoubtedly will surpass in energy, scope and effectiveness any previous effort of the kind. Consequently the third loan should, and will, be a greater success than either of its predecessors, which hardly more than scratched our immense resources of wealth.

The second loan was more successful than the first because the first had educated the people to the necessity and advantage of lending their money to the government. The second loan has advertised its successor by proving what our vast means are capable of, and has set the pace for the third loan.

Furthermore, behind this drive will be the tremendous motive power of a nation thoroughly aroused to the grim task before it. During the two previous campaigns we were only preparing for war. Now we are actually in it, although we are just beginning to fight in the sturdy, determined, American way. But our national temper is rising with every despatch from France which tells of our thin line wading bravely and successfully with the enemy, whose atrocities and bad faith forced us into the conflict.

So, just as there was a rush to the recruiting stations on the day we learned of the sinking of the transport *Tannia*, there will also be the greatest patriotic response in our history, or in that of any other nation, to the next government loan. There were more than 9,400,000 subscribers to the second Liberty Loan; it is reasonable to expect that there will be at least 12,000,000 subscribers to the forthcoming issue of bonds.

The Spirit of the People.

The spirit of the people has been strikingly attested by a noteworthy incident in the Middle West. A conference was held recently in a state famous for its popular authors and practical politicians, at which it was decided to declare a political truce during the drive for the third Liberty Loan.

During this conference Mr. George H. Dunscomb, of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago, remarked:

"This meeting is one which will be memorable in the history of the country, because here the Republican and Democratic parties have agreed to disregard all differences, in order that by united efforts they may obtain the greatest measure of co-operation and unity in the righteous cause for which our nation is fighting.

"A subordination of party aims and ambitions at this time is an expression of the higher patriotism and an evidence of the loftiest ideals. With the great political parties working as a unit in the interest of the Liberty Loan, far-reaching results will be obtained that otherwise would never be realized."

BIG MEETING AT BINGAMON SCHOOL

W. J. Wiegel Makes Stirring Address on German Atrocities.

Starting with a contribution of \$650 for Liberty bonds last night at the close of a patriotic meeting, Bingamon expects to raise at least \$2,500 before the campaign is closed. There are several rich farmers in the vicinity who have expressed themselves as willing to invest in bonds and if this is accomplished the amount should soar well into the thousands. With the school house filled at Bingamon last night a spirited gathering was held.

W. J. Wiegel, general manager of The Fairmont Printing company, delivered a patriotic address in which he flayed the cruel tactics used by the Hun. In this connection he told of some of the horrible reports which the United States minister to Belgium has reported. On one occasion a band of German soldiers called at a home in Belgium and asked the women: "Where are the men?" When they were summoned they stood them up against the house and shot them. "This is not fiction, friends, this is fact," continued the speaker. Another scene which he mentioned was one in which a German soldier thrust a bayonet through a baby and a moment later killed the mother. "This is not war, this is simply brutality," he declared.

Bank Deposits Increase With Sale of LIBERTY BONDS

What effect does the Liberty Bond sale have on bank depositors? It is interesting to know just what effect the sale of Liberty Loan Bonds is having on the bank deposits in this city. It could hardly be expected that the city of Fairmont could buy bonds to the extent of \$2,904,550 and not feel a shrinkage in deposits. Yet, after two Liberty Loans have been subscribed and paid for, the six banks of Fairmont have \$2,727,723.06 more on deposit than before the bonds were sold. Here are the actual figures.

Deposits March 4, 1918 after two Liberty Bonds had been sold . . .	\$8,534,742.76
Deposits May 1, 1917 Before Any Liberty Bonds Had Been Sold . . .	\$5,807,019.70
Increase In Deposits	\$2,727,723.06

We have more working capital than before the bond issues. The bank deposits of a community are its working capital. The greater the working capital the better business will be, the more people there will be working, the higher wages will be, and the more rapidly will business expand.

The results have been general. Fairmont is not the exception. The reports of the Comptroller of the Currency show that the total deposits of the National Banks has increased \$1,450,589,000 since the first liberty loan. In Virginia the deposits increased \$18,489,000, in North Carolina \$31,000,000. In Canada the Savings Deposits have increased \$336,350,000 since the war began, and in England, the increase in deposits in 1917 alone was \$1,000,000,000.

These figures ought to encourage us to buy bonds. Time has proven better than argument or logic that the buying of Liberty Bonds will not take the ready money out of this community. We know positively that the money we loan the government when we buy Liberty Bonds, comes right back to us, and more too.

Then let us buy bonds eagerly and abundantly. Let every man who has saved fifty dollars put it in a Liberty Bond. If you have not saved enough money to buy a bond, start now, and buy one on the instalment plan. If you have bought one, buy another. Our own boys will be coming back some day. Let them find Marion county homes full of Liberty Bonds.
