PITTSBURGH, June 14.—There was further improvement in the local stock market, with mining shares playing a smaller part in the dealings and the demand increasing for the dividend-paying. Ohio Fuel Supply continued its advance, reaching 46, the highest price for the year to date, and 4,120 shares changed hands during the day. This stock was also fairly active in the New York stock market, where it reached 46 1/2. Manufacturers Light and Heat was in moderate demand and after selling off to 48 1/2 recovered to and closed unchanged at 49. Pittsburgh Oil and Gas was firmer at 7 1/2.

NEW YORK, June 14.—A gradual hardening of prices visited moderate reactions accompanied yesterday's trading on the stock exchange. Dealings were light until the final hour when a spirited inquiry for U. S. Steel and some of the more speculative issues effected an active and strong close.

News of the day, both foreign and domestic, seemed to exert little influence although the first setback was coincident with the publication of the war bulletin.

Money rates were undisturbed by heavy transfers of cash to meet income tax payments, but the supply of time funds was exceedingly limited.
