NEW YORK

NEW YORK, June 25.—War news was the chief incentive for yesterday's strong and moderately active stock market, traders attaching much sentimental value to the Austrian retreat. Bulletin from the West front also gave impetus to the advance, which encompassed many leading issues, rails excepted.

United States Steel made a gradual rise of 2 1/2 points to 109 1/2, its highest level in a month on a turn-over that completely swamped all other issues. Related issues, especially Bethlehem and Crucible steels, moved forward in almost equal degree.

CHICAGO, June 25.—Increasing magnitude of the Austrian defeat, together with London talk of a possible separate peace with Austria, brought about a sharp break in corn values yesterday during the last 30 minutes of trading. The market closed heavy, 1/4c to 5/8c net lower with July 1.42 1/2 to 1.42 3/4; and August 1.40 to 1.40 1/2. Oats finished 1/2c to 1/4c off, and provisions unchanged to 1/8c higher.

Oil and Gas.

Light pumps and gasers were the heart of the Eastern fields had to offer at the beginning of the week. On Dolts Run, Battelle district, Monongalia county, West Virginia, the Hope Natural Gas Company drilled a test on the Noah Shriver farm into the Fourth sand, developing a first show of oil in that formation. On James Run, in the same district, the same company has completed a test on the W. L. Tennant farm. It is a gaser in the Gordon sand.

On Little Creek, Greene district, Wetzel county, the Damon Oil Company drilled No. 3 on the N. G. Myers farm through the Big Injun sand. It is barren in that formation and drilling to the Gordon sand. On the same stream and in the same district the Benedum-Trees Oil Company is due in the Big Injun sand at a second test on the Mary C. Snodgrass farm.

On Poca Run of Rush Creek, Smithfield district, Roane county, the Ohio Fuel Oil Company's No. 7 on the H. C. Taylor farm is through the Big Injun sand. A light show of oil was developed, but not enough to make a paying producer. It will be abandoned. On Steer Creek, Center district, Gilmer county, Godfrey L. Cabot has drilled a test on the Balba W. Bennett farm through the salt sand. It is a fair gaser. On Jacobs Run, Fox Mile district, Harrison county, the Stockton Oil Company has now drilled a second test on the Varner heirs' farm through the Gordon sand. It is a dustier and it will be abandoned.

On Lower Run, Grant district, Wetzel county, the Hope Natural Gas Company has made a location for a test on the Lucius Hays farm. On Fishing Creek, in the same district, the same company is building rigs on


