Spirit of Revolt in the Austrian Army

PARIS, June 28.—There have been rebellious outbreaks among the garrisons of the cities of Győr and Pécs, Hungary, as a result of which two thousand of the military involved in the mutiny have been condemned to death, according to reports received by the Matin today.

Both Austria and Hungary are affected by the revolutionary movement which is said to be in progress on a large scale in Austria, the newspaper services declare. The spirit of revolt is said to be strongly pervasive in the army. Violent demonstrations are reported to have occurred in numerous cities.
