**STUPENDOUS** \$1,000,000 submarine phantasy. "Queen of the Sea," starring Annette Kellermann, the modern Venus, has just been completed and will be shown during the coming season.

This spectacle is not only one of the costliest photoplays ever made, but it is also the most beautiful. Magnificent marine scenes, beautiful pictures of the floor of the ocean, mermaids, fairies and gnomes of the deep, all pass through its scenes in whirling, breath-taking thrills.

To show the time and care expended on producing "Queen of the Sea," it is only necessary to mention the work on the production began June 24, 1917, and only recently was completed.

More than 1,500 persons appear in the story. Five hundred beautiful girls pose as mermaids. The director used fifty miles of film. Scenes were taken in Bar Harbor, Me., Bermuda, Jamaica, Florida, Mexico and California. One expensive part of "Queen of the Sea" was the building and dynamiting of the Tower of Naivos and Swords, containing special intricate machinery for operating weird instruments of torture. Other scenes cost a king's ransom to reproduce.

Annette Kellermann, star of the production, not only gives many thrilling exhibitions of her swimming and diving abilities, but also reveals in beautiful poses the figure which has earned her the sobriquet of "the modern Venus."

**Musical Comedy Season About Over.**  
A South Sea Isle style of musical comedy revealing the Tropical Maids of Mary Brown's company in beautiful costumes, dancing the graceful dances of South Sea Islanders, and singing the most catchy songs growing out of the native music of these people, closes the company's engagement this week. Mary Brown herself, whose winning ways have made her lifelong friends among Hipp patrons, will have some of the leading numbers, and of course the dance specialties will represent as faithfully as this accomplished dancer can do, the original dances of the strange inhabitants of the tropics. Cozey and Walker, with their comely chatter and varied musical program can be counted on to do a good part in the bill.

Special costumes and appropriate scenery have been secured for the week-end production, and the closing hours of the 1917-18 season of the Hipp will no doubt be up to the high standard which has brought "the home of musical comedy" the most successful year in its career. Beginning Monday, a corps of men will go to work on the alterations Mr. Fisher has in mind, and the house will open in about three weeks.

**High Class Comedy at Princess.**

### WASHINGTON NEWS

**GOSSIP** By CHARLES BROOKS SMITH.

Ten thousand white men have been called for limited service, to report at Syracuse Recruiting Camp, Syracuse, N. Y., date of entrainment July 29-August 2, and West Virginia is called on to send 60 of this number; 3402 white and colored men, grammar school graduates, for general military service, have been called for August 15, and of this number West Virginia is to send 214 white men to the State University at Morgantown. No colored recruits will go from West Virginia under this latter call.

"I am firmly of the belief that our party will nominate Hon. Virgil Highland, of Clarksburg, for United States Senator," said Hon. Thomas Townsend, former State Tax Commissioner, who is at the Raleigh, having come from his home at Charleston to attend to important legal business here. "He is the most available man for the party to nominate this year and his leading position in the contest is largely due to the fact that the truth of that is being generally recognized by the Republican voters. With all respect to the personalities of the other three candidates, they do not meet party requirements no less than the exigencies of the national emergency, as Mr. Highland does. His candidacy very completely measures up to the demands of the hour.

Mr. Highland is easily the leading candidate in Kanawha county, and is expected to carry it. We are for him because we want to do what is best for our party and our country at this critical time. We as Republicans, feel that we cannot afford to disregard the seriousness of the situation. The Nation demands service, efficiency, success and Mr. Highland has them in conspicuous measure. The people are demanding more business men in Congress. The war has shown them that a successful war government must be a successful business government; it has shown them that the best government after the war to have is a business government. Government is business in these times. The big business men and not the big politicians are to be called in to service from now on. Mr. Highland is of the highest type of successful business men that West Virginia can proudly boast of. It looks to me like the Republicans of the State will offer his name to the Nation. From a party angle, and from every other standpoint from which his candidacy is viewed, it seems to meet the situation this year as no other.

"In Kanawha and surrounding counties, Mr. Highland's candidacy is easily the leading one and justifies the general prediction in that section that he will be voted the nomination by a handsome majority."

Hon. S. A. Scott, of Fayette county, general manager of the New River Coal Company, one of the largest in the State, said at the Hotel Washington today that he favored the nomination of Hon. Virgil L. Highland, of Clarksburg. Mr. Scott is an active Republican worker, has been a member of the State Committee of his party, and has been prominent in political affairs in campaign years.

"Mr. Highland's candidacy appeals very favorably to the Republican voters in my section of the State," he told friends. "We regard him as the eye of successful business man to represent the State in the upper halls of Congress. The policy of his campaign has been very creditable. It has been conducted on a high plane, thoroughly in keeping with the broadmindedness, sound judgment, and high character he possesses. His nomination will certainly have a most salutary effect upon the morale of our party, but it will inspire the sincere approval of the best and most patriotic thought that we have in our State. Such a man as Mr. Highland is in the Senate, will afford the people of West Virginia a feeling of safety and pride. He is, indeed, in every way worthy."
