State Leader Frowns on Men Trying to Make Own Regulations.

Reports are current that some of the miners in Northern West Virginia have grown arrogant since the coal strike ended and are laying down certain rules for their guidance, which apparently does not meet the approval of C. Frank Keeney, Charleston, president of District 17, United Mine Workers of America.

Mr. Keeney in part today said it is necessary that the miners cooperate with the coal companies as a contract cannot be regarded as such unless both parties live up to it. If the miner helps the company he is helping himself. It is necessary to have mental co-operation.
