The Helena, Montana Record-Herald gives the following account of the marriage of Miss Edith Hayes Grimes and Robert L. Waddell, which was solemnized there on Saturday, September 20. Miss Grimes is the daughter of Mrs. Eva Hayes Grimes and a granddaughter of Mrs. Christie Hayes Keener of this city.

An event of more than ordinary interest was the marriage of Edith Hayes Grimes, one of Helena's most beloved and charming girls, and Robert Laurie Waddell of Columbia, Mo., which took place Wednesday afternoon at the home of the bride's mother, Mrs. Thomas Alexander Grimes, 516 Harrison avenue.

While the guests were assembling, Honston's orchestra, which was stationed in the reception hall behind a screen of palms, rendered a delightful program which included the Nocturne in E Flat by Chopin, Souvenir Poetique by Sibelius and Love's Young Dream by Liszt all favorite selections of the bride.

Promptly at 4:30 as the bridal party descended the stairway, which was lined with smiles, studded with Shasta daisies, the musicians played the Bridal Chorus from Lohengrin, and Mr. Waddell, and his best man, Lee Grimes, a brother of the bride, took their places in front of the altar. Exquisite embroidered linens covered the altar, which had been improvised at the end of the long drawing room and upon which a beautiful seven-branch candelabrum with two single candlesticks at either side had been placed. Two tall Cathedral candles and stardust holding baskets of white and pink asters stood at the sides of the altar. The Rev. Lair W. Pink tapers in crystal holders completed the dining room appointments. 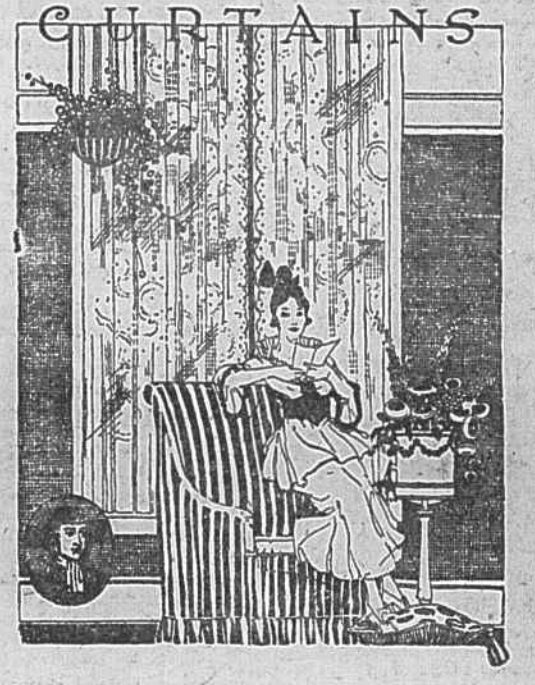
A large number of friends, relatives and associates attended the funeral, and the floral offerings were numerous.

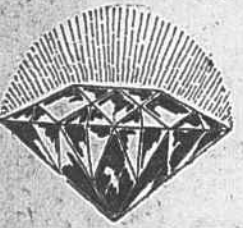
