SECOND GAME TO BE IN FEBRUARY, MAY PLAY AGAIN

Coaches of Valley Schools Arrange Schedules at Meeting in Clarksburg.

East Side High School will clash in basketball with the Icemen for the first time in the 1922 season on January 26. The game will be played on the new Fairmont High School gymnasium floor. The second game of the series will be played on the East Side on February 15. The date and place of the third game, if one is necessary will be decided later. This was decided with other things when the coaches of the schools in the Monongahela Valley High School Athletic Association met in Clarksburg on Saturday.

So far the Icemens and Mannington have been unable to get together on dates, but it is hoped that before long a series between these two teams will be arranged. East Side will play Mannington here on January 18 and at Mannington on February 9.

Fairmont High School will play Fairview at Fairview on February 29. The Icemens are booked to play Fairview here on January 19. Frank Lee's men will open the season here on January 13 with Weston, while the East Side will open on December 23 with Rivesville.

The schedules prepared at Clarksburg for the most part are only games in the league, and practically every team is planning to book a few games outside the league on the regular schedule, while all teams in the league will likely take part in the tournaments to be staged at the Fairmont State Normal School and at Buckhannon in March. Lee is planning to take his men on a trip toward the south end of the state, it is understood, while Jerry Blake of Mannington will likely take his men on a jaunt to the Wheeling section.

BASKET BALL QUIZ by Referee

Removal
In what cases can the referee remove a player from the game?
If a player makes four personal fouls he automatically removes himself from the game. The referee simply points to the exit sign when the fourth personal foul is committed by the same player. He can also be ejected from the game for a disqualifying foul.

Disqualify
What is a disqualifying foul?
When in the opinion of the official a player indulges in rough play that is entirely uncalled for, he can class such action as a disqualifying foul and remove the offending player from the game.

Jumping
Can a player jump center without having his hand in contact with his back?
When the ball is put in play in the center, each center player shall stand with both feet in his half of the circle, with one hand in contact with the middle of the small of his back.

Forfeit
When a game is forfeited by a team what is regarded as the final score?
A forfeit game is never to be desired. Regardless of whether or not a team believes it is being unjustly treated it should play the game under protest and continue to the finish. If a game is forfeited the score is regarded as 2 to 0.

Team Going Well
Last week's basketball practice brought forth some surprising results. Because of the abundant green material and so few veterans to report for practice, it was believed that the team this year would be greatly handicapped, but already Coach Copp has developed a formidable looking aggregation. Michael, Toothman and Mitchell at forward, Underwood, center, Lewis, Dodd and Mason at guards are showing mid-season form and will likely make a good showing during the year. O'Dole, Gump, Wyer, M. Wilson, McElroy, Neager, Fox, Machesney, Miller, and Maness will furnish plenty reserve material practically as good as the first string men.

Whether or not Abe Wilson, who for the past three years has been the main stay of the basketball team in the pivotal position, will be able to participate in basketball this season remains to be seen. Abe has been confined to his bed with an attack of typhoid fever for several months, but is now improving rapidly being able to walk about the house. He will re-enter school at the beginning of the second semester, and local fans are hoping that he will be in condition for the valley tournament which will be staged at Fairmont March 2 and 3. With Abe in the game, the chances of Fairview retaining the valley championship for another year would be increased 100 per cent.

Billy Evans, aided by more than forty football critics of the country, has named in All-Eastern eleven. Not a single West Virginia player is found on the first team, although three of the Spearsmen are on the honor roll of the East as compiled by Evans.

Russell Meredith is placed fourth among the tackles. Gullan of Brown, Treat of Princeton and Neidlinger of Dartmouth getting places ahead of him. Joe Setron takes fifth position among the guards, with Schwab of Lafayette, Sack of Pittsburgh, Breitader of the Army, Bedenk of Penn State ahead of him in the list. Nardacci takes fourth place among the half backs. Those ahead of him in Evans' list are Kaw of Cornell, Brunner of Lafayette, and Wilson of Penn State.

While West Virginia does not get a man on the first team Pitt gets two and W. & J. one. Kopf is given a place at end, while Bowser gets the center position with Sack on a guard.

In reviewing the selections, Evans says:
"Howard Gray, the sensational Princeton end, was practically a unanimous choice. Those who failed to select him for their premier eleven, have him a place on the second team."
"George Owen of Harvard ran Gray a close second for popularity. Mighty few critics passed up the Harvard star. Some placed him at half back, others at full back. The east boasted of a number of clever halfbacks during the season just closed. Kaw of Cornell and Brunner of Lafayette seemed to meet with the most favor among the experts.
