POSITIONS OPEN IN GOVERNMENT SERVICE

The United States civil service commission announces that the following examinations will be held to fill vacancies in the government service:

Stenographer and typewriter, field office, \$900 to \$1,200 per annum, for both men and women. During the past six months over 50 appointments have been made from the stenographer and typewriter examination. November 3, 1917.

Clerk, with a knowledge of stenography and typewriting. This examination is for clerks with a knowledge of stenography or typewriting who do not care to take the regular stenographer and typewriter examination. November 2, 1917.

Forest and field clerk. Entrance salaries, \$1,100 and \$1,200 per annum. Knowledge of stenography, typewriting and bookkeeping is required. November 3, 1917.

Assistant shipdraftsman. Puget Sound navy yard, Bremerton, Wash. Salaries \$2.40 to \$4.48 per diem. All qualified persons are urged to apply. Assistant shipdraftsman examination for the Puget Sound navy yard. Skilled laborer, ordnance equipment (male and female). For the special inspection of items of ordnance equipment, including articles made from leather, hardware and articles.

It is expected that a number of appointments will be made at an early date from the skilled laborer register of the state of Washington.

INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

The public service commission has set a valuation of \$12,429,507 on the Oregon property of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company.

A 62-acre farm near Dallas was recently sold for \$9,000.

A Chicago man has acquired a prune orchard near Freewater, the price paid was \$14,500.

A clove factory has been started at Albany.

The Southern Pacific Company is installing a gravity water system on its Willamette-Pacific line.

Madras will vote October 22 on \$5,500,000 bond issue for reclamation project.

Hermiston—The Valley Fruit Company of Walla Walla, Wash., has contracted for the valley fruit crop.

Baker—Eastern Oregon copper group sold to San Francisco capitalists.

It is reported that Grants Pass will lose its \$1,000,000 sugar factory for the reason that a sufficient supply of beets cannot be obtained. It is said that the plant will be moved to North Yakima, Wash., and another plant built at Medford if a sufficient acreage can be guaranteed.

The prune dryer at the Eugene cannery is now ready for operation.

Freewater—E. P. Jensen, of Ferndale, has just received returns on a carload of prunes recently shipped to Cleveland, Ohio. The car netted Jensen \$1,028, or \$80 per ton.

Dallas—The Willamette Valley Lumber Company of this city is at work getting out a rush order of fir timber for airplanes for one of the allied governments. The order, which came this week, is a "blind" one, coming from a dealer in the east, who stated that shipping destination would be given when notified that the order was completed.

MAXWELL OWNERS GET LIBERTY BONDS

In the recent contest staged by the Maxwell Motor Company in a nationwide gasoline economy test, over 40 Maxwell owners on the coast were awarded Liberty Bonds ranging from \$50 to \$200 as a reward for their efforts in establishing some new high marks in gasoline economy.

In San Bernardino several Maxwell owners received \$200 Liberty Bonds, one owner making 49.5 miles to a single gallon of gasoline, together with twelve other entrants who made a total average of 39.7 miles to the gallon. The highest mileage recorded was made in Atlanta, Ga., where one owner made 51.9 miles. Out of 2,000 competitors the grand average was 22.7 miles to the gallon and is considered remarkable in view of the fact that no special adjustments were permissible and each owner was compelled to drive his own car.

Numerous contests of a like nature will be arranged from time to time and many owners are seeking information concerning exact dates of the contests, being anxious to better their former high marks.
