TAKE CARE OF YOUR LIBERTY BONDS

From a letter received by the Mist from James K. Lynch, chairman of the Twelfth Federal Reserve District, it seems that unscrupulous stock salesmen have been inducing holders of Liberty Bonds to dispose of them. That the government does not approve of this, is evidenced in the following letter:

To all Liberty Loan State and County Chairmen, Twelfth Federal Reserve District.

There has been reported to us very considerable activity by stock salesmen and promoters, principally those representing companies whose securities are utterly worthless in efforts to exchange the stocks they are issuing for Liberty bonds.

This practice is specifically disapproved by the Treasury Department and we shall be compelled to characterize any continuance of it as an act unfriendly to the government.

If any such cases come to your notice, please write to me promptly, giving name of company issuing the stock which is being offered, its address, name of the salesman and of the officers of the company if you can get them.

Meanwhile, we hope that you will give wide publicity to this matter, with a view of stopping the practice complained of wherever possible.

SKILLED MEN WANTED IN ENGINEERING CORPS

A call has been issued upon the State of Oregon for certain skilled men who are needed in the Engineer Corps to be filled by white men physically qualified for military service.

No man who is needed to fill the July calls already announced will be allowed to volunteer for this service.

Volunteers may be accepted from the 1918 class provided the registrant waives all time limits for classification and examination.

Registrants qualified, as previously described, will be permitted to volunteer until July 17th.

If a sufficient number of volunteers are not secured involuntarily induction will be used.

The following types of men are desired:

Auto repairmen, axemen, blacksmiths, boatmen, bridge carpenters, cabinet makers, caulkers, concrete foremen, concrete workers, draftsmen, electricians, gas enginemen, stationary enginemen, farriers, horse-shoers, lithographers, machinists, buglers, photographers, plumbers, powdermen, quartermen, riggers, saddlers, shoemakers, surveyors, tailors, teamsters, telephone operators, timbermen and topographers.

Registrants desiring to volunteer under this call should at once notify their local board, but will not be inducted until orders are received as to allotments.

Volunteers for this service will not be released to the navy or marine corps or allowed to withdraw their application prior to August 1st.
