## PROMINENT YOUNG MAN OF COUNTY IS DEAD

MR. LEWIS COX DIED IN PHILADELPHIA HOSPITAL

WAS 21 YEARS OLD

And Was in Good Health Until About Three Months Ago—Funeral Tomorrow.

Judge W. F. Cox was yesterday informed of the death of his nephew, Lewis Cox, and son of Mr. J. T. Cox, of Belton, which occurred at the Episcopal hospital in Philadelphia, Pa., sometime Tuesday night. His body will be brought home today and funeral services will be held tomorrow.

Mr. Cox was taken to Philadelphia about three months ago for treatment for spinal trouble. It was known that his condition was critical but death was not expected so soon and it came as a severe shock to his relatives and many friends. His father left Belton Tuesday for Philadelphia but did not reach the bedside before his son died.

Mr. Cox was a young man about 21 years old and as one of the most popular in the county. He was facing a promising career and until about three months ago was in what seemed perfect physical condition. He attended the meeting of Bible students in Greenville in the early summer and was taken ill while there. He had to be carried home and was ill ever after.

Mr. George W. Cox, a brother of the dead young man, was in Anderson this summer attending Cecil's Business college. He left last week to become principal of a high school in Darlington county.

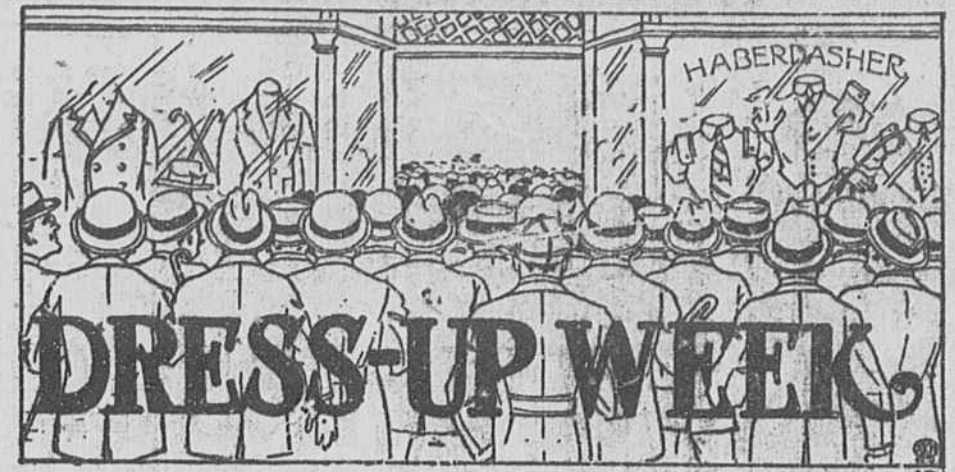
