#### Bryan Visits North Platte.

William J. Bryan was the guest of North Platte Saturday evening and Sunday, delivering a political address at the Lloyd on the former evening and addressing the Presbyterian synod Sunday afternoon. Mr. Bryan arrived from the east at 7:30 Saturday evening and was met at the depot by the band and several hundred men, women and children. He was taken for a short drive in J. B. McDonald's car, and then taken to the opera house, where in the presence of a crowded house he was introduced by Mayor Patterson, who welcomed the Nebraskan and classed him with Col. Cody as two of the best known people this country has produced.

Mr. Bryan spoke for nearly two hours, and in his address endorsed LaFollette as a republican candidate for the presidency, insisted that progressive republicans in Nebraska should vote the democratic state ticket, reviewed the work of congress in which progressive republicans assisted democrats in passing good measures, and commended the personnel of the candidates on the democratic ticket. Mr. Bryan received the close attention of his hearers and was frequently applauded.

Sunday afternoon Mr. Bryan delivered an address before the Presbyterian synod, taking as his subject "The Old Time Religion." The church was crowded, aisles and corners being utilized for extra chairs, and for an hour and a half the speaker held the close attention of his auditors.


