

FOOD FOR LIVESTOCK AND SOIL IMPROVEMENT.

Feed and forage crops are the limiting factors in livestock farming. Fertility is the limiting factor in the production; therefore, crops furnish abundant feed and at the same time enrich the soil, will make livestock farming profitable.

For wintering cattle, feeding steers and improving the soil, the velvet beans, both as a winter pasture crop and as a grain feed for cattle in the pen, is unsurpassed by any crop grown in the South.

A growth of three tons per acre of velvet beans (dried crop) will contain as much nitrogen as 500 pounds of nitrate of soda. If grazed by livestock practically all of the nitrogen will be returned to the soil. In addition there will be a profitable gain

in the weight of the animals and an addition to the humus contents of the soil.

Records show that 80 acres of velvet beans carried 100 head of cattle 4 months. Twenty tons of velvet beans with silage or other roughage will feed 30 steers, averaging 800 pounds for 120 days. If of good quality and fed properly, steers should make an average daily gain of two pounds on velvet bean ration and silage.

The early speckle velvet beans are the more valuable for seed on account of the high percentage of bean to pod and the ease with which the cattle can masticate the thin hulls.

Records show that South Carolina spent \$50,000,000 for feed in 1920. Had velvet beans been planted in all the corn and a yield of 800 pounds per acre gathered, the bean crop at

present price would be worth now \$16,056,000. This does not include the value of nitrogen that would have been returned to the soil by the vines.

Grow velvet beans this year—Make feed for livestock and enrich the soil.

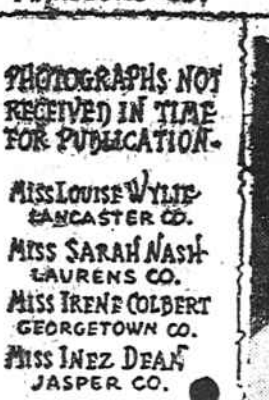

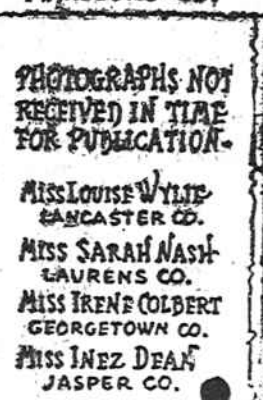
