FULL TICKET NOMINATED

And a Straight Out Set of Resolutions Adopted.—Nearly All Precincts Fully Represented.

GOOD MEN UP WHO WILL SURE WIN OUT

The Owyhee County Republican Convention which met at Silver City Monday brought together a more nearly full representation of progressive republican citizens of Owyhee than has assembled here in many a year. Only three or four of the smaller and more remote precincts in this great, big county were unrepresented, all the others turning out nearly full delegations.

The convention was called at 10 o'clock, a temporary organization was affected without delay by the selection of J. E. McDonnell of DeLamar, chairman, and John Grigg of the same, place, secretary; committees on credentials, order of business and resolutions were appointed and the convention then took a recess until 1 o'clock, to give the committees time to report.

Met again at 1 o'clock, the reports of the committees were read and adopted; the temporary chairman and secretary were made permanent officers, Mr. C. L. Lockwood was appointed assistant secretary and the convention, without any delay, got down to the work of nominating candidates for the several offices to be filled. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS AND PLATFORM.

We, your committee on platform and resolutions, recommend that the following resolutions, be adopted: The Republicans of Owyhee County in convention assembled this 3d day of October, 1904,

Resolved, That we most heartily endorse the present and former Republican administrations, and the National Republican platform of 1904; and that we most earnestly endorse President Roosevelt as the candidate of the National Republican Party for president of the United States, and commend him for his high ideals of public duty and service, and with earnestness recommend Senator Fairbanks as a candidate for vice-president.

Resolved, That we heartily endorse the declarations of principles adopted by the Republican State Convention at Moscow.

We most heartily endorse the present State Administration, the affairs of this state having been conducted by it with ability, economy and fairness; and we earnestly commend such performance of duty by our present administration as a guarantee of the patriotism, economy and ability of the Republican party to perform the high trust and duties of the state government.

We pledge the nominees of both our State and County convention, if elected, to the same faithful observance of the interests of the county and state duties and to an economical and business-like administration of public affairs.

We pledge that the legislative ticket, if elected in our county, will support an enactment making eight hours constitute a day's labor for all men working under ground and in reduction works.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment.

House Joint Resolution No. 5.

To Amend Section 10 of Article 18 of the Constitution. A Joint Resolution to Submit to the Electors of the State of Idaho for Their Rejection or Approval an Amendment to Section 10 of Article 18 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho Confering Certain Additional Powers on the Legislature Relating to the Time and Term of Electing County Commissioners

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Idaho:

Section 1. That Section 10 of Article 18 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to read as follows:

Section 10. The board of county commissioners shall consist of three members, whose terms of office shall be four years, one of whom shall be elected at the regular election in 1906 for a term of four years, and two shall be elected at the same election for a term of two years, and their successors shall be elected for a term of four years at the regular election thereafter.

Sec. 2. The question to be submitted to the electors of the State of Idaho at the next general election shall be as follows to-wit: "Shall Section 10 of Article 18 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be so amended as to permit the county commissioners to be elected for a term of four years?"

Passed the House of Representatives on the 11th day of February, 1903.
Passed the Senate on the 28th day of February, 1903.
