THE OUTLOOK SAID TO BE MORE HOPEFUL.

TARIFF LEGISLATION A BLOCK.

Large Preparations for an Increased Trade Are Being Made on the Belief That a Tariff Bill of Some Kind Will Be Passed—Bradstreet's Report—The War Not Materially Benefiting Us.

New York, Aug. 6.—R. G. Dun & Co's Weekly Review of Trade says:

An important change in the state of business is near at hand. Congress will act on the tariff question one way or the other, in all probability, within a week.

So much business has been deferred during the past year, and merchandise stocks have been so reduced, without certainty what it is to be, has this week encouraged large preparations for increased business.

The injury to crops by hot winds and drouth, if as great as some report, will affect all interests, but at this season it is never easy to distinguish between local and general damage.

Corn exports were only 116,438 bushels, against 1,599,781 last year, and receipts 1,952,843 bushels, against 2,532,976 bushels.

Sales of wool were 8,522,000 pounds, against 3,742,050 last year, and 9,330,400 the year before.

Chicago and Eastern Illinois to Remove Its Shops From Brazil.

BRASIL, Ind., Aug. 6.—Excitement prevails here over the announcement made by the Chicago and Eastern Illinois road officials that they would at once remove their repair shops from this city to Mommene, Ill.

A committee of leading citizens called upon Superintendent Broughton, who is in the city, and insisted that the officials allow their shops to remain here.

Commercial liabilities thus far reported in failures during July amounted to \$8,016,778, of which \$4,500,230 were of manufacturing and \$3,516,548 of trading concerns.

While little significance is attached to the moderate improvement in the state of trade at San Francisco, Pittsburg, Baltimore, Augusta and Atlanta, when it is added that clearing house totals for July report twenty-nine cities with larger aggregates than in July last year.

Wheat exports, with aggregate larger than those in June a year ago, it is presumed there are influences at work at the interior favoring an increased volume of business.

Wool remains steady at last week's advance, speculation having been stimulated by differences of opinion as to the tariff outlook for the staple.

War between China and Japan has not affected the price of tea here yet, although a pronounced demand is noted at New York, Boston and Chicago.
