KINGMAN KOLONY MOURNS DEATH OF MRS. VANDERPOOL

Was Well Known in Ontario Where Many Relatives Reside—Settlement of The Problem Considered—Other Kolony Items

The many friends of Mrs. Ella Vanderpool were grieved to learn of her death at the Holy Rosary Hospital in Ontario early last Wednesday morning, following a brief illness.

Mrs. Vanderpool had lived in the Kolony for the past five years during which time she had endeared herself to a host of friends thru many kindly acts.

The funeral services were held in Ontario Thursday from the Baptist church, the funeral sermon being preached by Rev. W. F. Cochran of the United Presbyterian church.

Mrs. Vanderpool is survived by her husband, her son, Kenneth, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bullard, her sisters, Mrs. Madeline Long, Misses Florence, Marguerite and Ethel Bullard and her brother Otis Bullard, all of Ontario and her sister, Mrs. Charles Splan of Vale.

Mrs. Vanderpool was born at Vale in 1896 and on October 25, 1915, was married to John Vanderpool. Shortly after their marriage they moved to the Kolony where they lived since then.
