

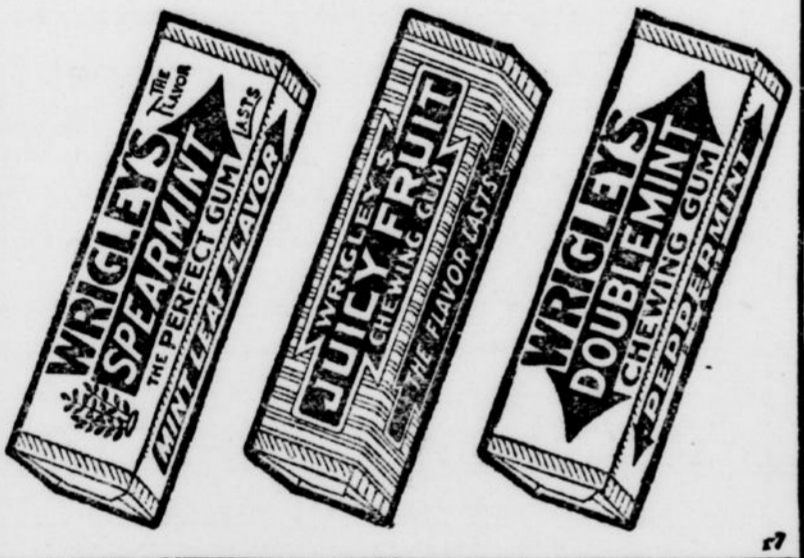

"Oh, no," answered Mrs. Gadspar. "My husband doesn't play poker."

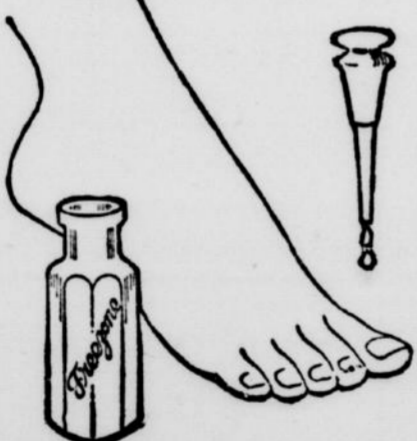

NEWS OF THE STATE

A RESUME OF IMPORTANT HAPPENINGS OF THE WEEK.

The contract for erecting a new brick public school building in Ree Heights has been awarded.

The government plans to send about 100 soldiers to State college this fall for a two-year course in auto, truck and tractor mechanics.

A branch trail from Mobridge to the Black Hills region is being considered by state officials and some sort of recommendation may soon be announced.

Montrose boasts of one of the strongest semi-professional ball teams in the northwest, and is anxious to book games with any strong team in the state to decide the state championship.

Local committees are making elaborate arrangements for a big homecoming celebration, which is to be held in Madison on September 18 in honor of the returned service men of the city and vicinity.

The rapid growth in population of Sioux Falls is shown by the enrollment in the high school, which, at the opening for the fall and winter term, shows an increase of 100 over the enrollment of last year.

Carl Christensen, director of the State college band, is swamped with applications for membership in the girls' band this fall. He says present indications are that more than seventy-five girls will want instruction on band instruments. The girls' band is an active feature of college life. The organization last year played at the soldiers' homecoming celebration at Sioux Falls.

Farmers can have samples of their own grain graded at the United States department of agriculture exhibit on the state fair grounds at Huron next week. The government has notified State college that it has provided a grain grading outfit in charge of federal grain supervisors who will explain and demonstrate how federal grades for wheat, shelled corn and oats are applied.

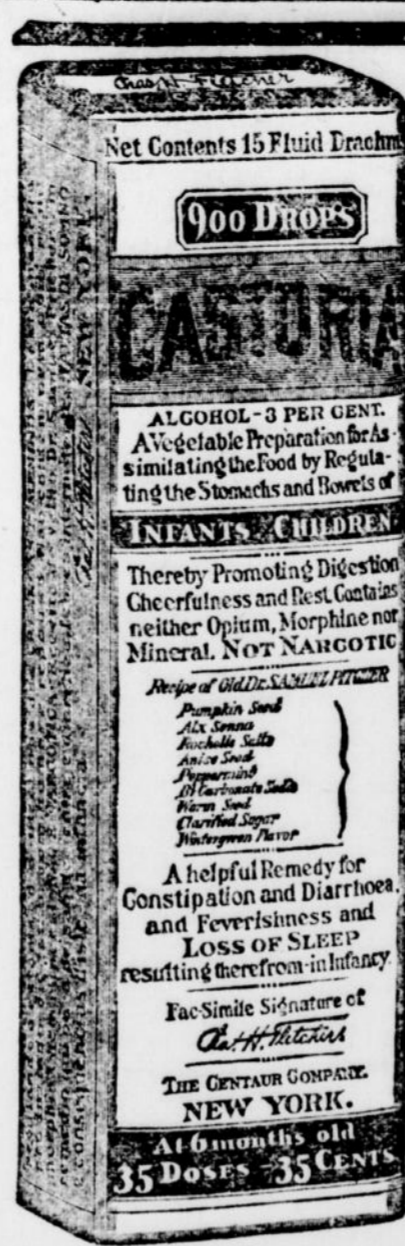
A few years ago the average farmer looked upon the man who procured a county office as being especially favored, and the office holder was envied for the income he received from that source. This was especially true in the small counties of the state. Last election it was difficult to get candidates for some of the county places, and in Sully county the county auditor has tendered his resignation on the ground that he needs to get back to the farm to make a living for himself and family.

The state auditor's department is sending out the annual warrants on wolf bounty claims, and is this year paying \$7.75 cents on the dollar, the highest amount ever paid under the pro rata law of payment of such claims. The last legislative session changed the method of paying wolf bounties, providing for payment at face value on presentation, instead of requiring the claimant to wait to the end of the year for pro rating the claims. The appropriation was increased from \$15,000 to \$18,000, and with the experience of several years, this amount should pay all claims on the fund.

Good roads enthusiasts from Wyoming and Montana have been visiting Lead and other cities of the Black Hills for the purpose of interesting the residents of this part of the northwest in the construction of an automobile highway to the Custer battlefield, situated on the Little Big Horn river, in southern Montana. It is planned to construct the highway through Sheridan, Wyo., which would evade the mountains of that section of Wyoming. It is possible that in time the proposed highway will be connected with some of the Black Hills automobile highways, so tourists visiting the Black Hills can, if they desire, after completing their journeys in the Hills, also visit the battlefield.

South Dakota, which for a dozen years has been the most prosperous state in the union per capita population, is now to lead the other states of the union in a statewide drive for better educational facilities. The big national conference on rural education, which will be held in Sioux Falls October 12-15, is intended to pave the way to concentrated efforts on the part of the federal bureau of education at Washington looking to an accelerated activity among educators all over the United States. This is the intention of the bureau, says Dr. J. L. McBrien, of Washington, school extension agent, in a letter detailing some of the aims of the government toward affording the children of the country greater opportunities for an education. The program for the big conference, which is expected to attract from 1,500 to 2,000 educators, is not yet arranged, but will be announced before long. This is to be the fifteenth conference of the United States bureau of education, which is bending all its energies toward obtaining better rural schools, the work having commenced in September, 1914, with the first conference in Chicago.

The discovery of oil at Fairburn, situated in the head of the Black Hills, has resulted in litigation over a number of town lots which different buyers purchased from an agent of the townsite company. The townsite company refused to issue titles to the lots and ordered the return of the money paid on them to the agent. The purchasers do not want their money back, but want the lots, and accordingly have secured the services of an attorney in an effort to force the townsite company to give them valid titles to the lots.
