The tourists did not need a park here, there were many along the way where they could stop. Now all can see the wonderful results. We have had Milbank people hundreds of miles away from Milbank hear of the famous park at Milbank. The tourists have been boasting all along the way, "Stop at Milbank, they have a fine park there." A hotel clerk in a Minneapolis hotel told one of our Milbank residents that a tourist had stopped there the night before and was loud in his praise of our city. Think of that, telling the check in a hotel of it, advising him to recommend Milbank as a good place to stop. The beauty of such advertising is that it increases in volume as time goes on. Everyone has several friends they tell, who in turn tell several more people. The advertising for the city is only one of the tangible results. Every tourist that stops here spends money and the total amount spent here in the course of the tourist season will be thousands of dollars.

While all of the advertising of the city and county may not pay such dividends or have such tangible results, in the long run money spent in such a way will bring its reward. Our roads, trains, barge lines, chautauquas, band concerts, baseball team and everything which tends to make Milbank a better place to live in are advertising Milbank, either for the better or worse. Everyone who wants to help boost the city and the county should make an effort to support these activities. Good advertising pays us and poor advertising makes us pay. Grant county wages only the good advertising.

THE growth of the U. S. Grain Growers Ass., has caused the big grain dealers and speculators no end of trouble. In fact they have organized a unit to fight the farmers organization. We believe the farmers are on the right track, and if they will bind themselves together in this cooperative movement, they will not only benefit themselves but the consumer as well. By having a strong organization capable of compelling such legislation as will directly affect them, they will accomplish their ends, but they will have to steer clear of politics. "Politics not Politics" should be their motto, which has worked successfully for the American Legion. The Grain Growers association of California, the Farm Bureau Federation and many other co-operative associations bear witness to what such an organization can do if it will use its strength and membership to gain their ends.

C. H. Gustafson, president of the Grain Growers has splendid ideas and we hope that he will be able to hold the organization to them. The following extract from one of his articles will give every farmer something to think about:

"We have no desire to interfere with legitimate marketing machinery, but we do assert that we have the right to carry our own grain crops to the market, sell them ourselves, and stop speculations and gambling. The speculative market works to the farmers' disadvantage. The men with whom representatives of the organized grain trade have raised \$250,000 to help the U. S. Grain Growers, Inc., assert that the market has no right to these disadvantages."

In the best recommendation for the organization that could be offered to the farmers, we note to spend such a sum of money is an attempt to prevent the farmers from deceiving their own market machinery is the strongest evidence that is a high time for farmers to make up.

"Whose money is going into this war chest? of a quarter of a million dollars that will be used to fight our farmers' organization? The answer is, that every one of us farmers is contributing, in the form of previous profits that have been made off our grain, but which has never come back to us. When our own money is being used to fight us it is about time that we did some scrapping ourselves."

The following resolution was presented by Ald. Branson, who moved its adoption, seconded by Ald. Branson.

M., at the Council Chambers in the Bouck Building in said City as the time and the place for the hearing thereon, and being not less than 20 days from the date of filing of said Assessment Roll;

And Whereas, Said Assessment Roll together with notice of the time and place of hearing thereon was published

in one issue of the Herald Advance an official newspaper of said City, said publication being not less than one week prior to the date of said hearing, viz: July 21st, 1921.
