Captain Ross is not attached to any militia company, but telegraphed his application from New York city. He was formerly a captain in the British Flying corps.

## DEMOCRATS HAVE THE ONLY FIGHT

HAVE TWO SET OF DELEGATES TO NATIONAL CONVENTION—REPUBLICAN TICKET IS HARMONIOUS.

Pierre, S. D.—Saturday night at midnight the date for filing affidavits for candidates for delegates to the various national conventions closed, and there will be no other candidates before the primaries for the republican convention than the list selected by the Republicans at the Mitchell meeting with the addition of Griesby, of Sioux Falls, Roney of Sturgis and Walton of Huron as independent candidates outside the general list picked at that meeting, and which will receive the general support of Republicans of the state.

The Democrats have two complete lists and the Socialists and Prohibitionists have each filed their names, the only real contest being in the Democratic party, which will start the internal fight the Republicans have finally dropped.

ton last night for 20,000 square yards of paving, or nearly two and two-thirds times the amount to be completed in Mitchell this summer. The contract called for 25 miles of curbing. The C. H. Atkinson Paving company, of Watertown, which has the Mitchell contract, was the successful bidder, the contracts amounting to about \$125,000.
