At the Michigan municipal elections on Monday, Hudson went Republican; every Republican candidate being elected by majorities varying from 14 to 112.—Benton Harbor was Republican, electing the regular caucus ticket. Paw Paw was Greenback by majorities ranging from 43 to 100, except it is said by the Temperance vote being cast for that ticket.

The Republicans won substantial victories at the municipal elections held in Maine on Monday. At Portland no Mayor was chosen, but the Council is Republican about 3 to 1. Hallowell is Republican for the first time in many years by a majority of 232 on Mayor. Lewiston is Republican by 48 majority on Mayor with 5 out of 7 Aldermen. Auburn is, also, Republican by a small majority.

We are pleased to learn that the House of Representatives sat down heavily on the proposition to tax church property. The Tax bill, substantially as reported by the committee passed the House on Thursday afternoon of last week. We hope it may pass the Senate, though we think some slight amendments would much improve the equality of taxation and secure the payment of taxes on a large amount of property which now escapes its just share of the public burden.

The Flint Citizen recently celebrated its 37 birthday. In all these years it has been in charge of Hon. E. H. Rankin, who as its editor and proprietor has made it one of the best newspapers published in the state. Long may he live to keep the Citizen doing for Genesee county its valuable work, and to enjoy the fruits of an active and vigorous old age. The support of the principles and policy of the Republican party, which have made his paper known, and its influence for the right, felt very largely over the state.

Mrs. A. Allen, who lived in West Owosso, dropped dead, probably of heart disease, at her residence on Monday forenoon; aged, only seventeen years, leaving a babe about four months old. At the time of her death she was alone with her babe, the crying which soon attracted the attention of Mrs. Grenier, living in the same house, and she went into the room and found Mrs. Allen apparently lifeless on the floor, near to her bed. Her husband and a physician were at once called, but all efforts to restore her proved ineffectual.

Another Pioneer has Passed Away.

On Monday night at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Hannah L. W. Austin, in this city, Mr. Phineas Austin, quietly passed away, aged 80 years, 3 months and eleven days. Mr. Austin was born in New Haven, Conn., Nov. 19th 1801, moved into this county, and settled on land previously located in Percy, on February 21st 1837, where he continued to reside until 1865, when he moved to his present residence, where he continued to reside until March 1881, when he returned to this county, making his home in this city with the widow of his son, Leonard. For forty years he was a member of the Baptist church, and a very efficient christian worker. Convictions of right dictated his every action, and as a consequence he was an ardent Republican from the organization of the party until the day of his death. Western Summer Resort.

The "Great West" is rapidly filling with people, and the people of the "Great West" are rapidly filling their purses. The comforts and luxuries which wealth can secure are no longer denied to the "settlers" beyond the Alleghenies. The energy which in so amazingly short time swept away the vast western forests and placed in their stead cities and villages, and all the appointments of a high civilization now very properly seek rest, at least during a portion of the year. And that rest should be in connection with other privileges as valuable as the needed rest. Those active, intelligent men and women, who so wisely and industriously laid the foundations of this great western empire, and upon many of whom yet rest the burdens of society, and have a right to the privilege of acquaintance with each other. Such an acquaintance cannot be gained without an arranged association. A well selected gathering place for such citizens, and well arranged refreshments, are the things demanded in the West. The summer season must be the time for such gatherings in this latitude. Where, then, and what, shall be the Summer Resort for western people?

1. WHERE?

It should be where it can be easily reached both by rail and by sail. Bay View meets that demand. It is at the head of Little Traverse Bay, in the northwestern part of the lower peninsula of Michigan. 2. It should be in the midst of pleasant scenery. Bay View meets this demand. True there are in sight no mountain glaciers or snow capped summits or deep cuts, and whirpools, or cascades. But there are as grand forests as can be seen anywhere this side California. And there are natural terraces rising one above another from the Bay to the height of hundreds of feet, covered with those magnificent forests. And there is the clear blue Bay itself, unsurpassed by any sheet of water to be found east or west, while in plain view is the broad lake Michigan on whose deep blue waters the steamers and the white sails pass, bearing away the products of ten thousand farms. And there, too, are the Bay View sunsets, which have been pronounced by travelled men more gorgeous and enchanting than the sunsets of Italy or California. To witness an autumn sunset at Bay View has richly repaid many a one for the long journey he has taken. Certainly this spot is not devoid of enchanting scenery.

3.
