Companies Can Only Use Highways With the State's Permission.

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH., Oct. 3,-A lecision made in the United States the entire country, as it affects the right of the Western Union Telegraph Company to use highways for their wires. It is the opinion of the court that the act of Congress permitting the Western Union to use all the Government postal routes to string their wires is permissive only and does not give the company the right to go into the States and use the highways unless by State authority. The court further holds that the charter gives the city authorities power to regulate the use of the public highway, and that the city authorities can exclude the wires from any street and can desirate to which sny street, and can designate in which streets the company can erect poles and string wires. When the injunction was dissolved last week the city authorithe cut down the poles and they are still down.

CHANGES IN THE POSTOFFICE.

Mr. Wanamaker Consolidating the Work for His Assistants, Postmaster-General Wanamaker in tends to make important changes in the administration of the Postoffice Department. He wants to bring all the offices that have to do with the transpertation of mails under one head and when Mr. J. Leavie Bell, at present the Superintendent of the Railway Mail Service, takes charge of the office of the Second Assistant Postmaster-General, which he expects to do to morrow, the Railway Mail Service will be placed under his control. FOREST FIRES.

An Immense Ares in the Black Hills

Swept by Fiames, RAPID CITY, S. D., Oct. 3.-The forest fires is all parts of the Black Hills are being got under control, but cannot be entirely extinguished until it rains. In the tin district about sixty square miles have been burned over but on most of it only brush and dead trees were destroyed. In the northern hills comparatively little damage was done. It is impossible to estimate the loss of timber and mountain ranches and mining camps. The fires during the present season have been the most destruc-tive in the history of the Black Hills, and though much feeling has been aroused no arrests have been made. No one has yet been caught in the fire.

"He is absolutely destitute of any sense of either gratitude or justice," was the final conclusion which the Speaker reached after a long discussion with his intimate personal friends yesterday.
