In discussing the adviseability of entering the five year old child into Hebrew studies, the noted Jewish educator adds: "Where bi-lingual training begins early, the methodological emphasis on the second language generally is informal. The oral-aural skills are stressed, rather than reading or writing, with the child "soaking up" the language through oral and visual presentations of vocabulary objects-through games, songs, tales, films, records, and the like."

With this, I am sure, those child psychologists who are firmly set against early language training would agree . . . As Rabbi Chanover continues his treatise, he in turn finds agreement with the "later age" advocates . . . For he says: "The reading act involves a complex process of symbolization."

D.P. Who Served As G.I. Sends For Mom And Sis



Charles Gottlieb, 24, a former DP recently honorably discharged from the U.S. Army, is reunited with his mother, Mrs. Cyrla Gryncajer, 48, and sister, Fanny, 17, on their arrival in New York from Belgium, their immigration assisted by United Hias Service, the Jewish international migration agency. Young Gottlieb, because he was born in Belgium, was able to come to the U. S. five years ago, while his mother, a native of Poland, was compelled to wait five additional years for a visa under the oversubscribed Polish quota, and her daughter elected to wait with her. The children were hidden by a gentile family during the Nazi occupation of Belgium. Their father died at the hands of the Nazis, and the mother survived a concentration camp. Charles had become a citizen, was discharged from the U.S. Army in January, and immediately called upon United Hias to bring his mother and sister to this country. The migration agency helped them obtain their visas and arranged for their transportation to the U. S. The happy reunion pictured here resulted.
