SHRINE DAY IN BANGOR.

Plans for the big ceremonial and character presentation of Anah Temple of the Mystic Shrine, which will be staged Thursday of Bangor Fair Week and which will be the big event of the fair on that day, are well completed and, except for minor details here and there yet to be arranged, stand in their final form. The Shrine affair will begin early in the morning with the arrival in town of the visiting nobles, including Aleppo and Kora temples from Boston and Lewiston respectively, and will continue through the afternoon with the gala parade during the early afternoon and the ceremonial and presentation of the charter to Anah Temple in the evening. As arrangements for the ceremonial parade now stand there will be three bands and three drum corps to see the pace for the march. Aleppo Temple of Boston with its 100 piece band, Anah Temple band and the Bangor band, Aleppo Kora and Anah drum corps are the organizations, while the Kora and Anah Arab Patrols as well as color in the nobles, will furnish plenty of other costumed procession. A feature of the parade will be the presence of Imperial Potentate James S. McCandless of Honolulu, accompanied by members of the imperial divan. The Imperial Potentate will occupy the position of honor in the parade and will at the later ceremonial present the charter to Anah Temple. Other imperial officers here will be Imperial Deputy Potentate Conrad V. Dykeman of Brooklyn, N. Y., Imperial Treasurer William S. Brown of Pittsburgh, Pa., Imperial Oriental Guide Clarence M. The Coal Situation

Last week there appeared in the columns of the Journal a statement asking the people of Belfast to notify me through the mail, stating the number of tons of coal they needed to carry them, until April 1.

My object is to find out, if possible, through the mail, how many tons of coal are needed for Belfast, and it is absolutely necessary to obtain this information through the mail, if it is to be of any use whatever.

My intention was to tabulate this list, giving the names and amount of coal wanted, using such a list with the State fuel administrator in an effort to get an adequate supply for Belfast, and I would be very glad to do this if the citizens of Belfast will take interest enough to give this information through the mail.
