CLINIC REHEARSALS OF CHORAL SCHOOL PLANNED AT W. C. U. N. C.


GREENSBORO, March 25.-One of the outstanding features of the Southern Choral School, to be held July 22-August 2, at Woman's college of the University of North Carolina, wil be the clinic rehearsal of the Children's Chorus and the High School Chorus, conducted daily by William Powell Twaddell, director of music in the public schools of Durham.

The Children's Chorus will be composed of 40 to 50 children, 10 to 13 years of age, and the High School Chorus will be a like number of senior high school students. Those attending the choral school will observe the rehearsals, and there will be time for discussion following each period. Mr. Twaddell will also teach a course in "Chorai Methods and Procedures.'

Mr. Twaddell began his musical career as a boy chorister, St. Andrews. Philadelphia, and later studied at the University of Pennsylvania, Temple university, New York university and Yale. He has studied organ and choral music under Frederick Maxson, David D. Wood, Harry J. Jepson, George Edward Stubbs, John Finley William son, and F. 
