'The Highland Call' Scheduled To Open In Fayetteville Monday

FAYETTEVILLE, Oct. 12.—Final plans are being rushed for the opening performance of Paul Green's "The Highland Call," here Monday night in the new city auditorium, with a cast of 100 actors including a number of Broadway professionals, reports Director John W. Parker, assistant director of the Carolina Playmakers of the University of North Carolina. Indications point to an even better drama than it was last year when acclaimed by 5,000 spectators in a week. It will run for three weeks this season.

Katherine Moran, who was Queen Elizabeth in "The Lost Colony," Mr. Green's historical play on Roanoke Island, will take the leading role of Flora MacDonald. William Bosworth, veteran New York author and actor, will act as "Mr. Mac," the narrator.

Also from the Broadway stage are John Straub (Dan Murchison), who has played with Orson Welles, Laurence Olivier and Vivian Leigh; Allan Frank (Col. Alexander McAllister), who made a hit as the old man Gepetto in the Broadway version of "Pinocchio"; and Pendleton Harrison (Allen Macdonald), a native of Alamance county, who has played in repertory in 44 States during the past seven years.

Davis, assistant professor of dramatic art at the University of North Carolina, is technical director and has designed entire new scenery. Ora Mae Davis, director of costumes for the Playmakers and "The Lost Colony," is in charge of costumes. Elmer Hall, former assistant dramatic art professor at Chapel Hill and for seven seasons stage manager at the Lakewood theatre, Skowhegan, Maine, will be general stage manager.

Miss Virginia Harlin, music director at the First Presbyterian church, Fayetteville, is directing the music for the show with a local choir; and Miss Ethel Bate-man, of Flora Macdonald college, Red Springs, is in charge of Scottish costume dances by Flora Macdonald college students.
