MAYFLOWER SOCIETY PLANS ASHEVILLE MEETING IN FALL

CHARLOTTE, Oct. 12.—Col. Francis R. Stoddard, prominent New York city attorney and Governor General of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants in the United States, will be the guest and speaker at the annual meeting of the North Carolina Society of Mayflower Descendants in Asheville Saturday, December 7, it is announced by Mrs. J. Eugene Reiley, governor of the state society.

Colonel and Mrs. Stoddard will come to North Carolina as guests of Mr. and Mrs. Burnham Standish Colburn, at their home, "Grey stone Court", in Biltmore Forest. Colonel Stoddard succeeded Mr. Colburn as head of the national organization of descendants of passengers on the Mayflower, at a triennial convention held at Plymouth, Mass., about a year ago.

A native of Plymouth, Colonel Stoddard is a graduate of Harvard and has been engaged in law practice and related activities in New York city for nearly 40 years. For several years he was in charge of the New York city office of the state insurance department and, later was state superintendent of insurance. Also, he served as the chairman of the executive committee of the national convention of insurance commissioners, as special deputy Attorney General of New York, and as arbitrator for many years in Greater New York fidelity, surety and casualty companies of the United States, in addition to several other important posts.

Coming of a military family, with ancestors serving in the Revolution and in the War of 1812, Colonel Stoddard himself served in the Spanish-American War, as a Major on the Mexican border in 1916, on an artillery mission at the front with the British and French armies and as Major with the 17th Division in the World War. Since then, Colonel Stoddard has served as Lieut. — Colonel of ordnance, O. R. C., Colonel of Coast Artillery
