Stamp Defiance Chapter To Unveil Marker To Revolutionary Soldier

The Stamp Defiance chapter, D. A. R. is proud to have the privilege of unveiling a marker near Clinton, November 3, 2:30 o'clock at which time they honor the memory of Lieut. Byus Boykin.

Marking soldiers graves of the Revolution is one of the first objectives of the National Society and as they celebrate the 50th anniversary of the National Society D. A. R. it is most fitting and appropriate that they penetrate the memory of one who fought to establish the independence of this country.

Byus Boykin was born 1747, Isle of Wight county, Virginia. At the early age of 18 he entered the Continental Army and faithfully served his country through his struggle for Independence, being promoted to the rank of lieutenant. He was the youngest officer on the staff of General George Washington. He married Sarah Peebles and settled on the Coharie river in Sampson county. He lived long to enjoy the independence he helped to fight for and died in 1812. Three of his brothers also fought in the war for Independence. On the old burial ground lie three soldiers of the three major wars that our country has engaged. Lieut. Byus Boykin, soldier of the Revolution. His sons, General Thomas Boykin war of 1812, John Boykin, war of 1812, Solomon Boykin, 1812. Solomon Boykin was killed in the battle of Neuse Bridge 1862.
