

CAROLINA BEACH BILL IS PLANNED

Rep. Morris Intends To Introduce Corporate Limits Measure Tuesday

Representative Morris has prepared a bill, which he expects to present in the house on Tuesday, affecting the corporate limits of Carolina Beach.

The bill reads: The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. Amend Section 1 of Chapter 188 of the Private Laws of 1937 by striking out all after the word "westwardly" in line 12; all of line 13; all of line 14; all of line 15; and all of line 16 including the word "sound" before the word "to" in said line 16, and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Running thence Westwardly THREE HUNDRED AND FIFTY (350) feet to Myrtle Grove Sound; running thence Westwardly across Myrtle Grove Sound to the western shore of said Myrtle Grove Sound at low watermark; thence Southwardly along said western shore of said Myrtle Grove Sound at low watermark."

TO EXPORT MEAT

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The Argentine ministry of agriculture announced today that negotiations have practically been concluded for the export to Britain of 40,000 tons of beef, 30,000 tons of frozen mutton, and 10,000 tons of pork before Aug. 31, 1941.

HOLLY RIDGE

HOLLY RIDGE, Feb. 22.—(AP)—It's Holly Ridge (two words) not Hollyridge—like it from Post Master C. C. Hines. Before the government started spending approximately \$10,000,000 at this little Onslow county town on an anti-aircraft firing center nobody had paid much attention to the spelling of the village name. And the 28 inhabitants didn't care much either.

But now that workmen by the thousands have piled into Holly Ridge the Holly Riders have become irked by the misspelling of the town name in the press, etc. That's how the postmaster put it—and he pleaded for a correction.

Hines blames the misspelling on a mistake on highway maps. Nevertheless, on page 454, volume 1, number 1, U. S. Postal Guide, Postoffice No. 76,232 is listed as "Hollyridge"—one word.

Roosevelt Works On His Papers In New Library

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Feb. 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt spent Washington's birthday working on his papers in the new library in which will be preserved the official and personal records of his years as the nation's chief executive.

White House officials said he had no callers today. Harry L. Hopkins, who was the President's personal representative in England for four weeks, accompanied Mr. Roosevelt from Washington, however, and the two had time for further discussions of the situation in Britain.

The relative warmth of the day enabled the President to take a long drive in the afternoon over country roads.

The period for listing of poll, real, and personal property taxes for 1941 for citizens in the city and county will close on Friday, February 22, J. A. Orrell, county auditor, said yesterday.

Tax lists for Wilmington township will be at the courthouse from 8:30 a. m. until 5:30 p. m. daily Monday through Friday during the coming week, he said.

"Some persons haven't listed as yet and we will be glad to have them come in. Anyone who fails to list their taxes for 1941 is liable to an indictment by the grand jury," Orrell pointed out.

STAMP NEWS

POSTAL paper of 21 Pan American republics will be given special attention during April. Officials of the Pan American Union at Washington, D. C., have announced a special philatelic display. April 14 is celebrated throughout the western hemisphere as "Pan American Day."

Cover collectors are reopening an old field in censor markings. Collection of these items, which ended shortly after the Armistice in 1918, is in full stride again, with plenty of British Empire and German mail supplying demands.

Overprints, natural result of war and occupation of conquered territory, are increasing, but only a few are reaching United States. Recent addition was the "Free France" overprint of French colonial stamps directing attention to General Charles de Gaulle's appeal to Frenchmen to defend the empire.

The numerous German issues bearing Hitler's portrait find no counterpart in the philatelic history of Kaiser Wilhelm, leader of the World War I. The kaiser's portrait appears on a single issue, the coronation stamp of 1900. He appears in a group and can hardly be identified.

New issues: Dominican Republic, small, single value picturing Marion Military Hospital; Slovakia: airmail in climb against background of huge bird; Philippine Islands, Jose P. Rizal, 19th century leader, orchids, and new airmail showing plane and native boat.

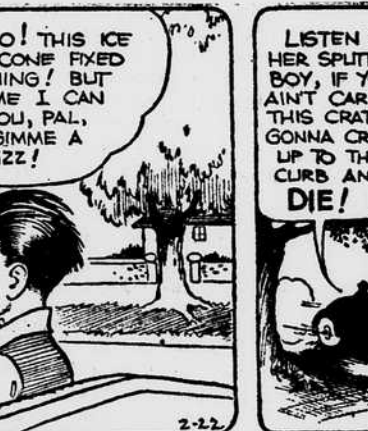

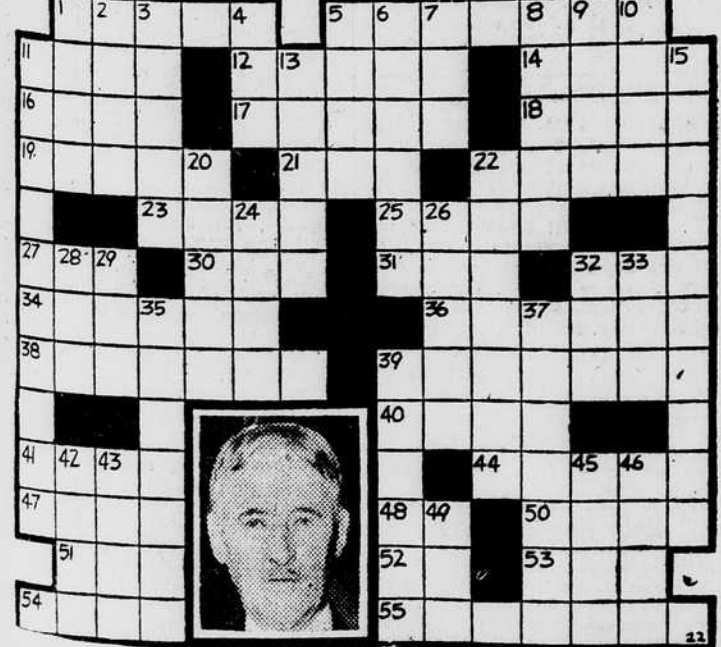

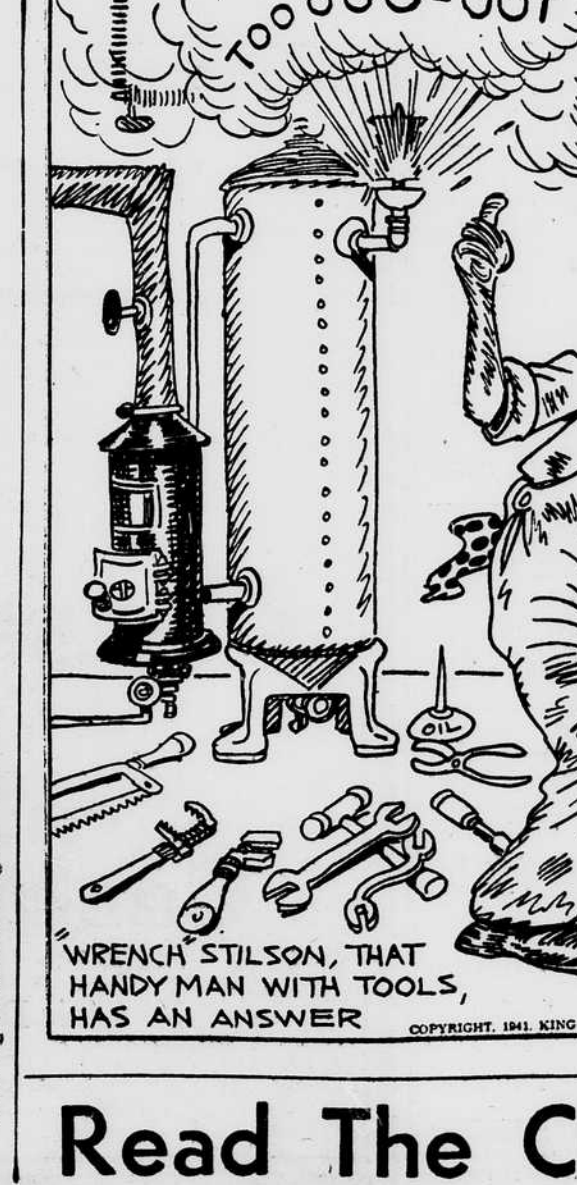
