BRAZIL OFFERS UNRRA MEASURE

Latin - American Country Propounds Plan To Finance Program

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov 15 _(A)_ As delegates of countries wrestled with the complicated problem of financing the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, Brazil came forward today with the suggestion that the financial formula be based on foreign trade figures.

Eurico Penteado, Brazilian delegate, said his nation, largest exporting country in South America with the exception of Argentina, which is not a member of UNRRA, would like to base her contributions on her foreign trade with the areas which would receive relief. For his country, he said, the problem of reviving Europe after the war would be more than a humanitarian one. He said it also would be a commercial question, since Brazil, living on foreign trade, wished to regain her European customers as soon as possible. The nation, he said, would not want to wait until Europeans had lost

the coffee-drinking habit. Penteado said Brazil expected to meet her financial contribution to UNRRA largely through coffee, but also through supplies of cereals, sugar, cocoa and cotton.

The Brazilian plan did not appear to be uniformly acceptable here to Latin American delegates. To Men In Tropic Lands Carlos Davila, Chilean delegate, said a figure based on foreign trade would take too much out of Chile.




