

NAZIS MAY LEAVE NORWEGIAN PORTS

Crippled Condition Of Surface Navy May Force Evacuation

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 15.—(P)—The crippled condition of the German fleet may force the Nazis to abandon northern Norway as a naval base and even evacuate the Far North before the turn of the year, responsible naval authorities here believe. Some units of the fleet have been withdrawn to the Baltic Sea during the last few months.

Another reason for withdrawing the German fleet from Norway's fjords is the fact that the Allies no longer send convoys to Murmansk. It is to combat this supply line to Soviet Russia that the Germans moved some of their heaviest units into the northern waters.

Here in the latest information obtainable here on the Nazi fleet itself:

The 10,000-ton cruiser Admiral Hipper, long laid up in a Baltic port, has been written off for the duration; the Hipper's sister ship, the Prinz Eugen, is reported to have been converted into a training ship; the Gneisenau, a 26,000-ton battleship mangled by the RAF when she made her dash from Brest to the Baltic last year, is reported being used as an anti-aircraft training school at the Baltic port of Gdynia; the pocket battleship Luetzow, previously reported to have been sabotaged, is reported here to have been damaged so badly it is uncertain when she will return to action; the 35,000-ton battleship Tirpitz was damaged last September when British midget submarines made a daring attack into her fjord hide-away; and the aircraft carrier Graf Zeppelin is reported in a Baltic port, needing months of work to put her into fighting shape. As a result, the 26,000-ton battleship Scharnhorst and other units which might be still lurking in northern waters may up anchor and sneak for the Baltic.

Malaria Greatest Threat To Men In Tropic Lands

DURHAM, Nov. 15.—(P)—Malaria is the greatest threat to the health of service men going to the tropics. Dr. Herbert Charles Clark, director of the Gorgas Memorial Laboratory at the Panama Canal Zone and foremost authority on tropical diseases, declared today in giving an illustrated clinic at Duke university school of medicine.

"Most service men consider snake bites and the possibility of being eaten by crocodiles as the prime dangers of the tropics, but these are insignificant in comparison to disease-carrying insects," Dr. Clark said. "We now know that service men who go to danger areas do not sufficiently realize the danger of malarial conditions. Service men are being taught to protect themselves both by the use of proper drugs and the avoidance of danger zones."

Dr. Clark said that deep in the jungle one is relatively safe from malarial contagion, but it is at the ports and native villages that the seed beds of the disease develop. There mosquitoes, ticks, and lice contact diseased persons and consequently themselves become dangerous disease-carriers.

BRAZIL OFFERS UNRRA MEASURE

Latin - American Country Propounds Plan To Finance Program

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 15.—(P)—As delegates of countries wrestled with the complicated problem of financing the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, Brazil came forward today with the suggestion that the financial formula be based on foreign trade figures.

Eurico Penteado, Brazilian delegate, said his nation, largest exporting country in South America with the exception of Argentina, which is not a member of UNRRA, would like to base her contributions on her foreign trade with the areas which would receive relief. For his country, he said, the problem of reviving Europe after the war would be more than a humanitarian one. He said it also would be a commercial question, since Brazil, living on foreign trade, wished to regain her European customers as soon as possible. The nation, he said, would not want to wait until Europeans had lost the coffee-drinking habit.

Penteado said Brazil expected to meet her financial contribution to UNRRA largely through coffee, but also through supplies of cereals, sugar, cocoa and cotton. The Brazilian plan did not appear to be uniformly acceptable here to Latin American delegates. Carlos Davila, Chilean delegate, said a figure based on foreign trade would take too much out of Chile, proportionately, since so many of the companies exporting from Chile were owned by foreign capitals.

Penteado's suggestion came after a finance committee meeting in which it appeared that the United States and England would prefer a financial basis predicated on national income. He said it would be simpler to ask a Brazilian contribution from the general population based on foreign trade, since everyone understood they were producing for a sale abroad. He added that the problem of determining his nation's national income would be too great.

England's position was explained thus: She lives on foreign trade, but because much comes out of one pocket and goes into another, she would be playing a much larger proportion of the entire purse if the basis were set on foreign trade. A combination formula may be evolved as the delegates strive for payments that could cause least hurt to their respective countries.

Germans Report Mass Of Allied Ships In Naples Harbor Works

A large concentration of Allied vessels in Naples harbor and active British mine-sweeping operations in Gaeta Gulf indicates the Allies are preparing to make an amphibious landing behind the German lines on the Tyrrhenian coast of Italy, Capt. Ludwig Sertorius, Nazi military commentator, declared in a broadcast last night (Monday).

"Between Mignano and the Garigliano river mouth, the left wing of the Fifth United States Army hardly has stirred for about a week," he said in a Berlin broadcast recorded by the Associated Press. "It is quite possible that this inactivity is caused by the not yet concluded preparations for the new Allied landing enterprise."

Sertorius said Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's Eighth Army was massing enormous quantities of artillery along the Sangro river front near the Adriatic, and that as soon as these preparations were complete "a mass attack against the Sangro sector must be reckoned with."

State Publications Committee Convenes

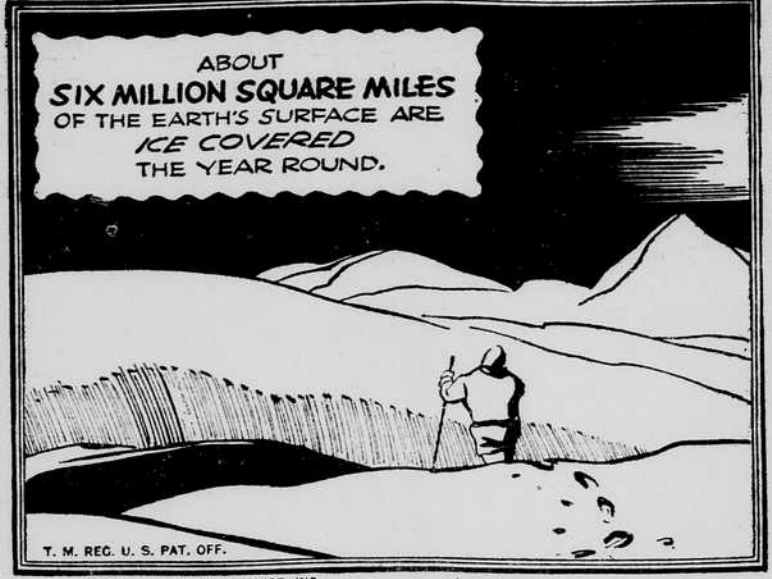

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—(P)—Although hog receipts at Chicago today were slightly under last Monday's run, receipts at the principal Western markets ran the highest since November of 1940. Fed steers and yearlings closed steady to strong. Trading in the sheep market was dull with incomplete clearance on all classes. Receipts of 19,000 hogs was larger than advance estimates and weights from 200 to 270 pounds, which are supported by the government at \$13.75, held to that price. These weights predominated in the run and were well cleared out by all buying interests. Packers had an additional 10,000 head on direct billing. A top of \$16.50 was paid for choice 1,310 pound fed steers with medium and good grade fed steers and yearlings a little higher than last week's sharp decline, the bulk selling for \$13.00 to \$16.00. Beef cows were weak to 25 cents lower and canners and cutters were down 25 to 40 cents, canners showing the most decline. Fat lambs were off 75 cents to one dollar with ewes fully 50 cents lower. The top price of \$13.50 was paid for natives by city butchers.

NEW YORK COTTON
NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—(P)—Cotton futures closed 30 to 45 cents higher today after a comparatively steady session following an early rally that pushed prices up to 65 cents a bale. The steadying effect was caused by growing belief Congress will defeat the Administration's subsidy bill, which is due for a showdown within the next week.

The Bureau of Census report placing October cotton consumption at 846,209 bales was slightly lower than expected and had a temporary depressing effect.

Spot markets remained quiet and the continued flow of government orders in textiles prevented development of any sizeable civilian business. Futures closed (old contracts) 30 to 45 cents higher.
