Since an adolescent cannot escape learning about unpleasant aspects of sex-prostitution and de-linquency-it is wise to teach them moral, social and health implications as related to themselves and society, continues Miss Grayson.

Halibut Stew 2 pounds halibut fillets small onion, sliced

2 teaspoons salad oil 1 tablespoon parsley, chopped 4 tomatoes, quartered

1 green pepper, chopped 2 large potatoes, diced 1-2 teaspoon salt 1-4 teaspoon pepper

3 cups water Cut halibut into serving pieces. Combine fish, onion, oil, parsley, tomatoes, green pepper, potatoes and seasoning in saucepan and simmer five minutes. Add water,

cover tightly and cook one hour. Coleslaw With Tarragon Sauce 2 cups shredded cabbage

1-2 cup sour cream

1-2 teaspoon salt

1-8 teaspoon pepper 1 tablespoon tarragon vinegar 1 tablespoon chopped chives or minced onion

1 teaspoon capers (optional)

1-2 teaspoon paprika Mix salt and pepper, add vinegar and stir until well blended. Add cream and beat with a rotary beater until the dressing thickens. Add chives or onion and capers. Add to shredded cabbage just before serving.


